Another of the pioneer residents of Grey County passed away on Friday, July 4th, 1930, in the person of Mr. William Morrison. He had enjoyed good health until a few months ago, when the weight of years began to take effect. A few days before death he was taken to the hospital here that he might receive special attention but the end came on Friday as stated above.
Eighty years ago the late Mr. Morrison was born in Silgo County, Ireland, and in the same year his parents came to Canada, settling at Dunroon. Later they moved to Osprey township and here, in 1875, he was married to Miss Maria Kernahan. They took up farming and were successful. About three years ago William, who purchased the Elliott farm east of this village.
The late Mr. Morrison is survived by his widow, five sons and one daughter, namely: Ernest of McCord, Sask.; John A. in Euphrasia; Edgar H. and Russell of Regina, Sask.; William; with whom he resided, and Mrs. J. W. Gamey, Strathclair, Man. Two brothers and three sisters also survive, Irwin Morrison of Owen Sound, W. J. Morrison, Mrs. Alex. Fisher and Mrs. Thos. Fisher of Stayner, and Mrs. Henry Spott, Vancouver, B.C. Edgar H. and Mrs. Gamey were home for the funeral services.
The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon to Markdale Cemetery, Rev. H. S. Warren, pastor of Annesley Church, conducted the services at the house and grave. The pallbearers were Messrs. Frank Taylor, Geo. W. Ross, Wm. Wright and Chas. Long. Many beautiful floral tributes were placed on the casket.
The late Mr. Morrison was a very fine type of man and was held in the highest esteem. A great many of the old neighbors from Osprey attended the funeral on Sunday as well as friends from Barrie, Midland, Collingwood, Owen Sound, Toronto and other points. He was a consistent member of the United Church.
