
Caribou in Canadian North

The mature bulls may be said to confine their sea sonal movements to the central part of the caribou range Thus in the spring migration the bulls are in the lead at the beginning but the cows soon overtake them and pass through their ranks. The cows continue on to the fawning grounds, while the northern limit of the bull migration is governed by the desire to secure goo summer pasturage and to escape in

Garden of Eden Set In Africa Hot Plain

One of Wonder Orchards of World Was Discovered by Boers in Early Days

North of Capetown, writes Major .W. Howlett in "The London Daily Felegraph," there is a varying coastal plain of great beauty, thunderously hot in the hot weather, but diversified and cooled, to the eye at least, with multitudinous groves of oak trees and wayside channels of running water. Everywhere the horizon is bounded by great challenging mountains. They have no softness of rounded outline like the English Downs, but in peak and pinnacle and crag, in frowning escarpments and deep-hollowed kloofs they bid defiance to all the dwellers in the plains, naked and unashamed.
