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Liberal-Conservative Candidate in South-East Grey



To the Electors of South-East Grey:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—It may be taken for granted that many of you have already decided how you are going to vote on Monday next. The radio broadcasts, the newspaper articles and the public meetings have done something to inform you with regard to the important questions. You must surely realize that this is one of the most important elections ever held in Canada. You do not need to be told of the unemployment and the lack of prosperity which is so much in evidence from British Columbia to the Maritime Provinces. The low prices for agricultural products, the accumulation of unsold stocks of merchandise in our mills and factories, and the many thousands of people out of a job is ample proof that something is radically wrong.

To say that depression exists in other countries is not enough. It is for us to set about the curing of our own troubles. If we remove the cause we will go a long way in effecting a cure. We, as a nation, have an adverse balance of trade. We are buying abroad more than we sell to other countries. We ship out of our country countless millions of dollars worth of raw materials and import greater millions of the finished products of foreign people. That is the chief cause of the unfortunate condition in which we find ourselves. Such a course leads not to prosperity.

And the cure is as simple as the cause. If you will provide that our workmen shall not be compelled to compete unfairly with mass production and cheap labor in foreign countries, and if you will provide that our farmers shall be freed from the unfair dumping of agricultural products into Canada, our workmen will have jobs and the agriculturist will have a market for his products at a profitable price.

If you are agreed that such a solution is desirable and in your interest, the only way to reach the desired objective is through the Parliament of Canada. Your member in the House of Commons should be pledged to the support of legislation which will give adequate protection to the producer in Canada, so that the great Canadian home market for the products of field and factory will not be exploited for the benefit of outsiders.

I stand pledged to such action, and it is the first plank in the policy which I would gladly support in the interest of the people of Canada. It is an easy thing to say that one is in favor of "removing the economic burdens from the backs of the agriculturist." We have been hearing that kind of thing talked for the last nine years and there has been no action taken in all that time which could justify the expense of a parliamentary representative. What we surely want is action, and immediate action.

If you electors of South-East Grey want a representative who approves of the free importation of wool and wool yarn, who prefers United States eggs to Canadian eggs, and who REFUSED TO VOTE for the cancellation of the New Zealand agreement which has ruined our cream and butter market, then I can hardly expect your support. If you people of the riding want a representative who approves of unfair competition from the products of the factories in other countries, which results in unemployment in the Canadian mills and depression throughout the country, then you can hardly support me.

I do appeal to you to support your own interests. The lines are clearly drawn, and forgetting what your political leanings may have been in past years, it is not only your privilege but your duty to support a cause which will materially improve conditions in Canada. If you elect me as your representative it will be my chief business to support all legislation which has that end in view. Should I fail to interpret the sentiments of the people of South-East Grey it will be your duty to call me to account at the end of the next Parliamentary term. I say to you simply this—Give yourselves a chance; give Canada a chance, and give me this opportunity of serving both Canada and the people of South-East Grey.
