First Lamb Fair in Grey County a Big Success

The first joint Lamb Fair under the direction of the Dominion and Provincial Livestock Branches in co-operation with the Grey County Department of Agriculture, was held in Markdale on Tuesday, August 12th. This fair was a decided success in every way. There were approximately 135 lambs brought in to be shown and marketed and these lambs were of exceptionally high quality.

The ground champion lamb was exhibited and shown by Russel Hanna, R.R. 1, Meaford, who is a 1929's club member. Elgin Sherman, R.R. 5, Tara, another club member, was also high in the prize money.

This Lamb Fair was largely the result of extension work carried on by the Ontario Livestock Branch in Grey County whereby boys who had not previously raised sheep were given sheep by this branch. The results of the work done by Mr. T. S. Cooper, Agricultural Representative, in improving the quality of marketable lambs was also manifest at this fair.

Mr. Wm. Howard, of the Dominion Livestock Branch, was the official judge. Others who contributed to the success of this fair were W. P. Watson and R. H.
