One of the most highly respected residents of Holland township in the person of Mrs. James Brown, passed away on Thursday, August 21st, 1930, from the result of an accident on Highway No. 10. While driving some ducks across the road she was hit by a truck driven by Mr. A. Whitaker of Ceylon.

The late Mrs. Brown, whose maiden name was Alberta Shore, was born 62 years ago in Albion township, Peel county, and with her parents, the late Richard and Catherine Shore, moved to Euphrasia some years later.

In 1893 she was married to James Brown and they settled in Holland township. She is survived by her husband; two sons, Herbert and Earl at home, and four daughters, Mrs. James Semple, Markdale; Mrs. Bert Badgerow, Saugan Junction, and Miss Alma of Toronto; two granddaughters; a sister, Miss Margaret Shore of Markdale, and three brothers, G. W. Shore of Woodbridge, and Levi Shore and Henry Shore in the States. The late Mrs. Brown was predeceased by three sisters, and three brothers, Ann Jane, Charlotte, Harriet, Wesley, Samuel and Richard.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Wm. Coutts of Markdale, assisted by Rev. B. L. Walden. The pallbearers were Messrs. Abe Hamilton, McFadden, R. G. Walker, Harry Clarke, John McFadden and John Bonner. The flower bearers were Messrs. Wm. Aitken, Alvin Foster, Russel McCann and Emerson McCullough.
