Dear Mr. Editor:  
While visiting the recent Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto to one afternoon during the last week, my attention was arrested by the stirring marching air of a brass band. Glancing across the green, I noticed it was leading a procession of junior live stock judging teams, representing the various counties of the Province of Ontario, each county being indicated by a banner.

Being an old Kimberley boy, and thus a native of Grey County, I quite naturally proceeded to a point of vantage, so that I might get a good view of the young farmers from Grey. Their banner was quickly recognized, and instead of some 20 or 25 stalwart young men and handsome young ladies (which was but quite natural to expect from a large county, judging from other counties), to my great disappointment there were by actual count 7 if my memory serves me correctly.

I am sure there were many others also from Grey County, who, like myself, were very keenly disappointed. I feel there is something wrong somewhere, as Grey can proudly boast of many thousands of acres of the best farmland in Ontario, and her live stock herds, particularly sheep and cattle are second to none in Canada.

Is the local agricultural representative not giving good leadership or have the farmers considered they have no more to learn and are, therefore, not co-operating as fully as they should.

Let us hope that a new interest will be created and that the junior stock judging team of 1931 from Grey, will consist of at least some 25 or 30 members, and that they may be successful in carrying off a fair share of the prizes.
