The Late Mr. W. Ernest Morgan. Just as the leaves fade away into their beautiful autumnal glory, so fade the life of one of our prominent citizens, Mr. W. Ernest Morgan into Life Eternal on that "Beautiful Isle Beyond". Death occurred at 8.25 o'clock Tuesday morning, Sept. 16th at Christie St. hospital, Toronto, after a prolonged illness extending over a year, with valvular trouble of the heart and chronic bronchitis.

Mr. Morgan was only fifty years of age, was born in North Oroy, Yorkshire, Eng. on Sept. 6th, 1879.

He was educated in Morpetri Northumberland, England. He was a builder in Canada 27 years. He served in South African War 1900-1902. He served in the C.E.F. in the World War, as non-commissioned officer; reached England and returned through illness 1916-1917. He acted as assistant secretary in the Lib-Con. Association for several years.

He received the Queen's Medal and five clasps for Africa and a General Service Medal for the Great War. He was a staunch member of the Prince Arthur Lodge A.F. & A.M. No. 333 Flesherton. He was an Anglican in religion.

Mr. Morgan was a kind neighbour and friend, always willing to aid in any cause. In his passing we lose a valuable citizen; He was patriotic in every sense of the word. The funeral took place on Thursday, service being held in the United Church at Eugenia and conducted by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Pherrill of Markdale (Anglican minister), assisted by Rev. Dr. G. S. Smith of Meaford and Rev. Mr. Pope, local minister. Rev. Mr. Pherrill spoke impressively on Mr. Morgan's sterling qualities and preached a very comforting sermon from the text "O grave where is thy sting?"

Rev. Mr. Smith spoke feelingly from the text "And O pray for the deceased were, sung, "Oh Love that will not let me go", "A-bide with me" and "Son of my Son". The choir rendered beautifully "Safe in the arms of Jesus".

The remains, followed by a large concourse of friends and sympathizers, were taken by motor to Flesherton and interred in the family plot in the cemetery there, to await the glorious resurrection.

On the casket lay the Union Jack and many beautiful floral tributes showing love and respect for the deceased and sympathy for the bereaved. The tributes were:

The flower bearers were members of the Masonic Lodge as also were the pallbearers who were Messrs. Geo. McTavish, Ernest Proctor, Jas. Dargavel, Geo. Banks, Thos. Fisher and Cecil Moldrum.

Besides a loving wife, whose maiden name was Miss Daisy Smith, and a daughter Patricia and a son Douglas, he leaves in sad bereavement three brothers and one sister, Fred of Scotland; Arthur of England; Thos. of Toronto and Annie (Mrs. Storey) in Scotland.

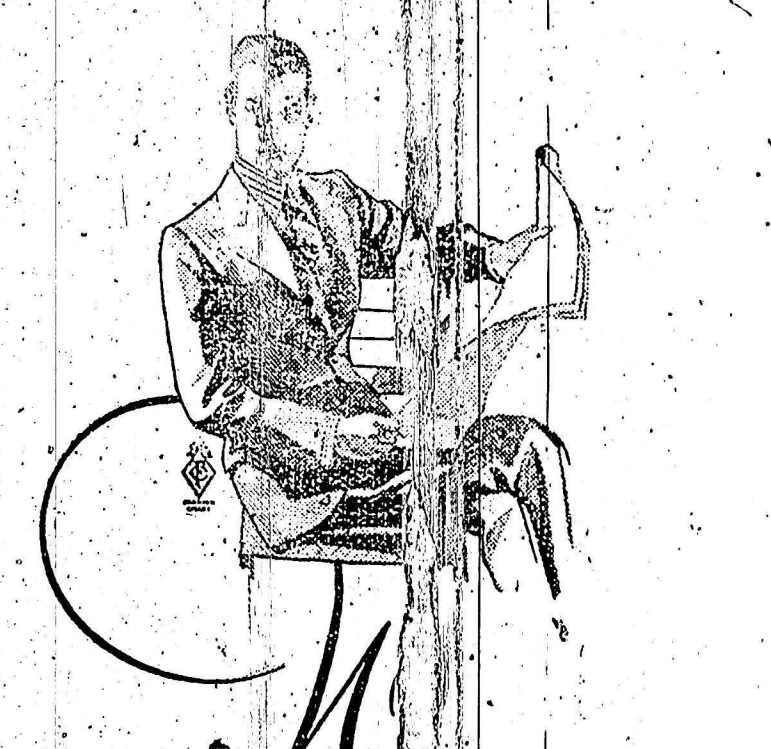
Mrs. MacTaggart of Sarnia is visiting her daughter Mrs. Russell Sparling.
