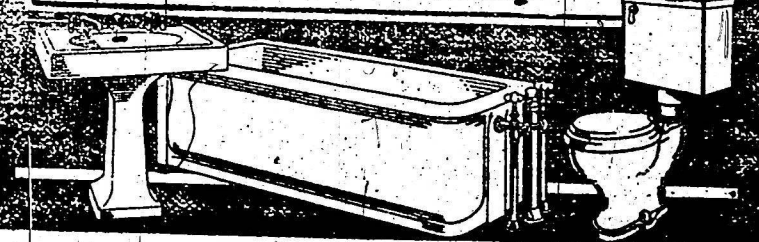

Donald McDonald

One of the oldest residents of Glenelg township passed away in Durham hospital last Thursday afternoon in the person of Mr. Donald McDonald, at the age of 80 years, after an illness of some months. Last week he became worse and suffered a paralytic stroke, and on Wednesday was brought to the hospital here for treatment, but his condition was so serious that from the first little or no hope was held for his recovery.

The late Mr. McDonald was born in Vaughan township in 1850, but for his whole life was a resident of Glenelg, coming here with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Archibald McDonald, when an infant of six months of age. The family settled on the Durham Road near the 40th sideroad, and the life of the deceased had been almost entirely spent on the old homestead.

The late Mr. McDonald followed the teaching profession for years, in which he was eminently successful, but was forced to give up his work a few years ago owing to failing eyesight and ultimate blindness.

He was married to Miss Sarah McKinnon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald McKinnon, who passed away in 1888, leaving her husband and an infant daughter to mourn. The daughter died at eight years of age. Following the loss of his eyesight, Mr. McDonald lived with his sister, Miss Christina McDonald, who kept house for him until her death two years ago.

Of his family of five brothers and four sisters, the sole surviving member of this well-known pioneer family is Mr. John McDonald of Edge Hill, now ninety years of age, and still in comparatively good health.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon from the residence of his brother at Edge Hill, the service being conducted by Rev. Mr. Stewart of Priceville Presbyterian church, of which the deceased was a devoted member. Interment was made in Durham cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. A. D. McKinnon, Charles McDonald, James Brown, John Calder, Earl McLeod, Duncan Cameron, Gordon Leith and Arch. McDonald. Amongst the floral tributes were those from the family, the Leith family of Egrement, and the South Grey Teachers' Association of which the deceased was for years a valued and respected member.—Durham Chronicle.

After the death of his parents he sold this property and an adjoining farm and purchased the Thos. Anderson farm, further east. He farmed most successfully. Being a bachelor and living alone, he being a most strenuous worker, often neglected to have his meals regularly and 'tis supposed that this had something to do with causing his early death. Deceased was one of the strongest men ever Glenelg knew and was always in demand at a tug of war. A more obliging helpful neighbour never lived and he was the soul of honor, honesty and truth. In politics he leaned to the Reform side; but quite often voted differently. He was a strong supporter of Zion United Church and for years has supplied No. 5 School with its fuel supply, acting as trustee, some years ago for a 3-year term.

He was the elder son of the late Wm. and Bessie Banks and is sur-

The little girl met her untimely end when she fell into a keg of sour milk, which she had in some manner knocked the top off while playing around it. Despite immediate withdrawal of the child by Mrs. Weldrick, resuscitation methods proved in vain, as the thick fluid had choked up the lungs of the child.

Muriel Maher Drowned

Miss Muriel Maher, daughter of Mrs. Maher of Toronto and the late Frank Maher formerly of this place, was drowned on Tuesday at Shanty Bay. In company with Mrs. A. M. White she was holidaying at Shanty Bay and had been lying in the sun on the dock. When she rose she stumbled and fell into the water, about thirty feet deep, and being unable to swim was drowned before assistance arrived. Rev. R. A. Spencer of Toronto recovered the body about twenty minutes later but life was extinct.

The late Miss Maher, who was 26 years of age, was a daughter of the late Frank Maher and Mrs. Maher, who were residents here some years ago and later at Chatsworth.

Bad Accident on Highway

George Fisk of Owen Sound was badly injured and his wife and baby were badly shaken up in an accident which occurred on Saturday evening a little above Berkeley. The Fisk family were motoring to Markdale in a Ford sedan and at the top of one of the hills met a large transport truck coming in the opposite direction. The road is wide enough for the two machines to pass but for some reason they met head on and as a result the Ford car was badly damaged and Mr. Fisk seriously injured. Mrs. Fisk and the baby were not so badly injured but all three were brought to the hospital here. After having their wounds dressed, Mrs. Fisk and the child went with some friends to their home in Euphrasia but Mr. Fisk had to remain for treatment. He is now out of danger and it is hoped that no serious after effects may result.
