

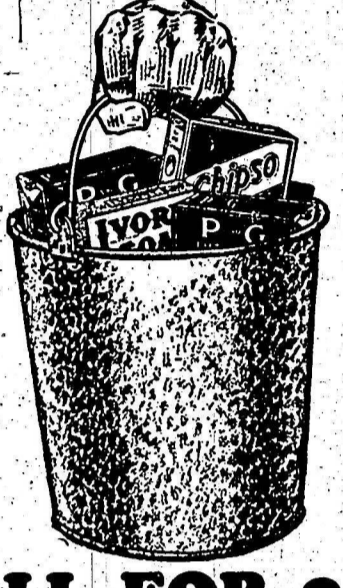

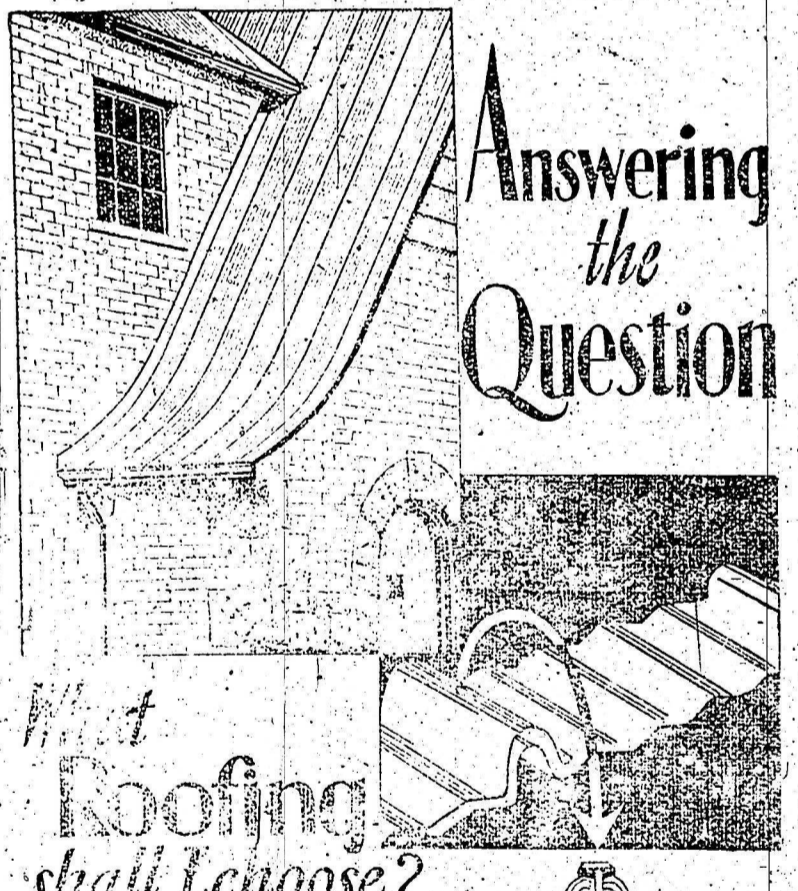

Another Successful Fair

Another success has been scored by the Directors of the Markdale Agricultural Society and the annual show held on Wednesday of last week will go down in history as one of the best yet held. The weather was unfavourable on Tuesday but in spite of this there was a splendid display of the inside exhibits, as good or even better in some sections than in former years. The School Fair exhibits add much to the attractiveness inside the hall.

The showing of horses was even better, we believe, than in former years, particularly in the heavy classes, and the competition was very keen.

The showing of cattle was away ahead of that at any of the several fairs which we have visited this fall and many animals of exceptional quality were among those shown. Sheep and swine were up to the average of former years. Taken all-in all the showing was better than an average.

Swinton Park Pipe band supplied an abundance of Scotch music and led the parade of the School children to the grounds early in the afternoon. R. W. Thymne, "the Kansas Farmer," with his violin playing and singing provided entertainment for a large section of the crowd during the day.

In spite of the cool and threatening weather the attendance was good and the gate receipts amounted to about \$700.00.

The entertainment in the evening, put on by Jamie Reid and his assisting artists pleased the large crowd. The receipts were about \$200.00.

The race horses were not so numerous as we have seen them on account of so many fairs the same day having races close by. The 2.25 class did not fill leaving four horses for the 2.18 class and three for the classified class. Each race was hotly contested. Billy Brino won the 2.18 class in straight heats while it took five heats to decide the winner in the classified race. The track was in good shape and the races were in the capable hands of Mr. O. Wilder, the popular starter of Brampton.

Final Debate

The Final Debate in the Debating Series in the Young Peoples' Union of Grey Presbytery of the United Church was held in Annesley Church Markdale on Monday evening, Oct. 6th, between the Young Peoples' Societies of Dundalk and Annan and was won by the former.

The subject was "Resolved that complete disarmament on both land and sea is long over due and should be proceeded with immediately."

Miss Florence Bell and Mr. Clarence Armstrong of Annan upheld the affirmative and Miss Evelyn Shuldice and Mrs. Neil Stewart of Dundalk supported the negative. All four speakers did exceptionally well and brought forward strong arguments to support their cause.

The judges were Dr. L. G. Campbell, Mr. W. J. Messenger and Mr. R. D. Carruthers who decided in favour of Dundalk by a narrow margin. They are now champions of the presbytery.

Following the debate Miss Irene Martin of Eugenia winner of the Public Speaking contest in group no. 1, gave her speech on "The League of Nations." This was also exceptionally good. As there were no contestants from the other three groups of Presbytery Miss Martin is now champion.

Miss Maxine Lyons, president of Markdale Young Peoples' Society spoke a few words of welcome. Miss Ruth Armstrong presided at the organ. Mr. Howard Graham, convenor for the Presbytery occupied the chair.

Mrs. Elizabeth Carbert

The death occurred on Saturday last at her residence here of Mrs. Elizabeth Carbert, widow of the late Wm. Carbert of Harkaway district, who predeceased her eight years ago. She deceased had been in failing health for the past month or more, the end coming peacefully, following a paralytic stroke.

The late Mrs. Carbert, who was the daughter of the late Myles and Jane Campbell, was born at Castlemore, County of York, in 1856, coming with her parents, at nine years of age to Elderslie township, Bruce county, where she was married to Mr. Carbert in 1875. A year or two later they moved to a farm at Harkaway, where they continued to live. After the death of Mr. Carbert, with members of the family still at home, she moved into the village to spend the evening of her life.

The late Mrs. Carbert was of strong Christian character, always quiet and unassuming. She was a member of the former Methodist church at Harkaway, and later of Annesley United church here, where she was a regular attendant.

Surviving are four sons and six daughters, R. H. Carbert, principal of Chesley High School; Wm. J. of Berkeley; Cecil on the homestead, and Archie of Holland Centre; Mrs. J. Henning and Mrs. Roy Thompson of Euphrasia; Mrs. Wm. Catchpole of Owen Sound; Mrs. A. R. Morrison of Toronto and Misses Edith and Ethel of Markdale, all of whom were present for the funeral. A son, Walter Kell, died several years ago. Surviving also is one sister, Mrs. Heatley of Leduc, Alta., who was unable to be present and who is the last of ten sisters and brothers.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon. Following a short service in the home, service was held in Harkaway Church, conducted by Rev. J. R. Wilkinson of Temple Hill, a former pastor, assisted by Rev. H. S. Warren of Annesley United Church, Markdale and Rev. Mr. Kitching, pastor of Harkaway church. The Grey County Championship School Fair was held in Markdale on Saturday last and it was attended by a big crowd of spectators as well as by school children from all parts of the county. Upper Canada Bible Society

Since 1804 the Scriptures have been published in 618 languages and of these since 1904, 240 forms of speech have been captured for the Kingdom of God. In what was known as "darkest Africa" the bible, or parts of it, have been issued in 203 languages. Of the 10 fresh translations published in the last twelve months 5 are for Africans, 1 for Oceanic people and 4 for Asiatics.

The Society since 1804 has issued 397,000,000 volumes, 211,000,000 of which have gone out in the last quarter of a century. That means we have circulated 25,000,000 volumes more in the last twenty-five years than in the previous century. During the first fifty years of the Society's existence, 569,000 copies were issued every year. During the second fifty years the annual average was 3,175,000, and in 1928 11,399,540 volumes were issued, an increase of 1,462,826 over the number for 1927-28. For the blind 4,326 copies in embossed type were issued, 1,508 more than in 1927.

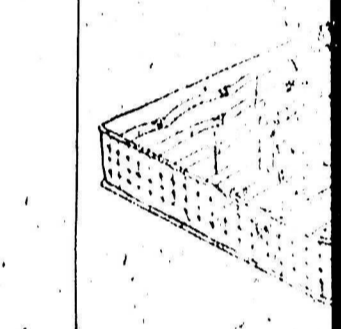
