United Church, Walters Falls

On Sunday, Sept. 28th, the United Church held special services to commemorate the semi-centennial church opening. Services were held morning and evening and the church was filled to capacity. Rev. H. B. Moyer of Preston, a former pastor of nearly forty years ago, preached eloquent and touching sermons to appreciative congregations. Rev. J. C. Lowrie, the present pastor, assisted with the service and read a letter of regret from Mr. W. W. Perry of Scarborough Junction and a story of their journey his father, mother, sister and himself from Picton to Walters Falls fifty years ago. Mr. Perry's father was the late Rev. D. Perry, who arrived on this circuit in the summer of 1830. The choir was composed of old time members, Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Barker of Owen Sound, who were leaders in the first choir; Mrs. Hiram Bondell, Miss S. Delere of Owen Sound; Miss L. Delere, Mrs. Robt. Jerry, Mrs. J. Campbell (nee Minnie Delere) Mrs. P. Reid, Mrs. S. Abercrombie, Mr. and Mrs. A.H. Ward, Mr. Robt. King, Mrs. S. E. Campbell and Mrs. Chas. Carney, Mr. and Mrs. Barker, Mrs. Campbell and Rev. Moyer rendered a quartette in the morning and Mr. and Mrs. Barker a duet in the evening.

The church was beautifully decorated with flowers and plants and golden rainbows colors.

At the close of the morning service a delightful time was spent when old friendships were renewed and greetings were heard on every side. Everyone was eager to shake hands and have a word with their old pastor and his good lady. Quite a number from a distance stayed with friends, some from Toronto, Milton, Elmvale, Owen Sound, Markdale, Benford and Brampton and attended the evening service and some remained for the Monday entertainment.

A history of the early years of the church, prepared by Mr. and Mrs. Ward was read by Rev. Moyer, who interspersed it with many interesting anecdotes. The first service was held in 1864. The cornerstone was opened and a letter taken out and read descriptive of the ceremony and those present fifty years ago. The building committee and the first opening on Christmas Day of 1889 was described. A number of former pastors sent regrets and short speeches of congratulations were made by Rev. Mr. Wilkinson of Temple Hill and Rev. Mr. Parsons.

Next came the ceremony of the candle lighting of the beautiful four store cake and bearing fifty candles. The first candle was lit by Rev. Lowrie for Mrs. Jas. Delere

the oldest church member living, although unable to be present. Rev. and Mrs. Moyer each lighted a candle, then Mr. and Mrs. Barker, Mrs. Shepherdson and Mrs. Brown, who made the cake, and so on down the list of church members, afterwards the cake was cut by four ladies and passed throughout the audience by four young ladies. By request Rev. Moyer sang "Rock of Ages" in his fine tenor voice. The program closed with one verse of "Blest be the tie that binds". Thus a very successful and pleasant celebration came to a close with proceeds about \$144.

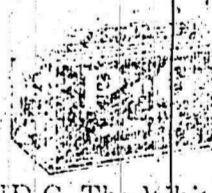

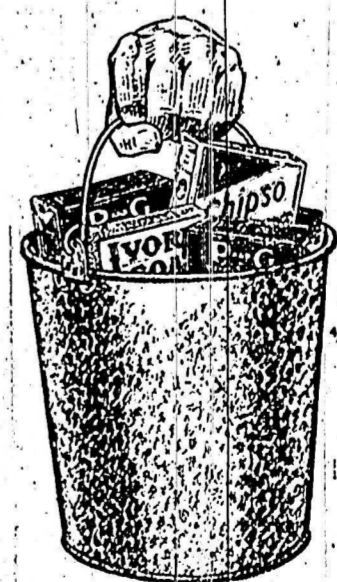
