Mr. and Mrs. Weller and family spent the week-end in Midway.

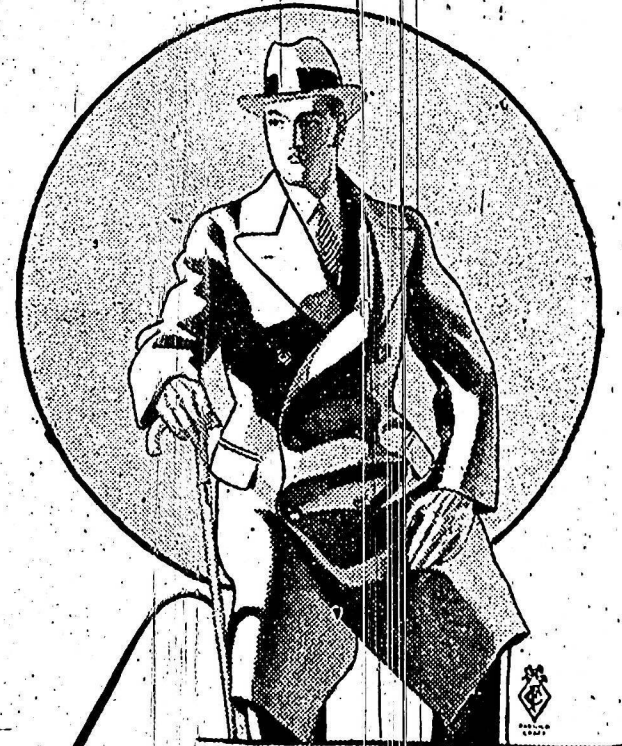
