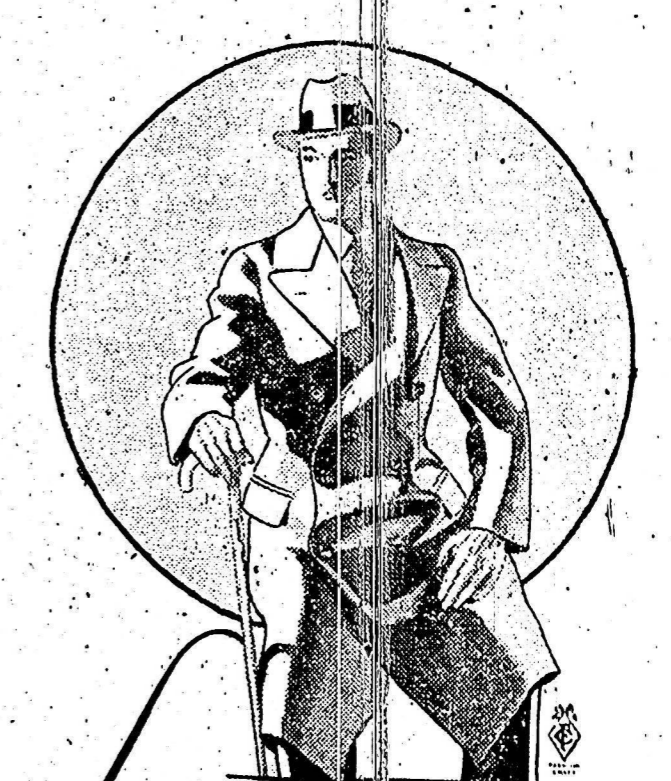
Anglican Church Notes

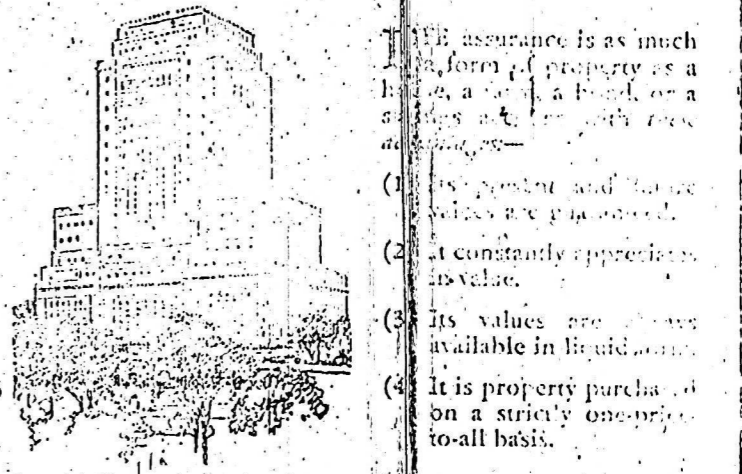
