Messrs. Bates Fawcett and John Park went to Owen Sound last week to secure a position. Success boys!

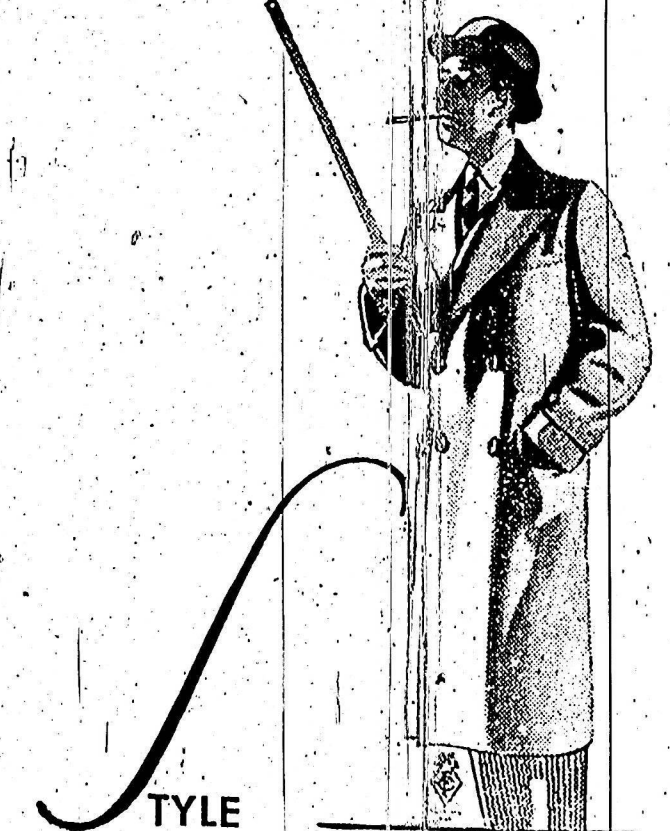
