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Mr. Henry Wells Dead

At the ripe old age of eighty-eight years, nine months and four days Mr. Henry Wells of this place passed to his reward just before the midnight hour on Sunday November 23rd. He had been in failing health for some years and a few days before his death suffered a severe stroke.

Mr. Wells was one of the pioneer settlers in Euphrasia where he lived before retiring to Markdale some years ago. He was born in England and came to Canada when a young man. He is survived by his widow and a grown-up family who have the sympathy of many friends in their hour of bereavement.

The funeral is being held this (Wednesday) afternoon to Markdale Cemetery with service in Annesley Church at 2 o'clock.

Bernice Jane McLellan

On Thursday, November 13th, 1930, the angel of death came in mercy to one, Bernice Jane McLellan, R.N., of Niagara Falls, General hospital, wife of John Alfred McLellan of Princeton, B.C. The deceased was born near Berkeley, in Grey County, in 1882, eldest daughter of the late Wm. Ewart and Mary Ewart of Niagara Falls, Ont. She received her early education in the Meaford Public and High Schools, afterwards learning the dress-making and millinery trades. This latter vocation she followed for some time before entering the nursing profession. In 1915 she graduated from the Western Hospital in Toronto, receiving the General Proficiency medal. Some time later she took a post graduate course in Vancouver General Hospital, B.C., specializing in "Child Care". In 1923 she was united to John Alfred McLellan of Princeton, B.C., who survives.

On August 1st, 1928 while walking in Princeton street the late Mrs. McLellan was struck by an out-of-control motor vehicle resulting in injuries which resulted in death in spite of the most expert medical care and operations in the hospitals of Princeton and Vancouver, B.C., St. Michael's and Western hospitals of Toronto and General Hospital of Niagara Falls. The last fourteen months were spent with lower limbs in a cast, suffering agonies which no medical skill could alleviate.

The late Mrs. McLellan was a woman of deep religious faith, a member of Princeton United Church and through all the weary months her spiritual faith never faltered. Neither was she heard to utter a word of reproach against the injustice meted out to her by the courts of those responsible for her injury. Being widely read and possessing a keen intelligent mind the deceased retained her conversational powers and cheerful disposition to the last. Though by times irrational, her lucid spells were marked by such clearness of thought that all who knew her marvelled.

She is survived by her husband, her mother, one brother, Archibald M. Ewart of Toronto, two sisters, Mrs. J. Jamieson (Eva) of Wallaceburg and Mrs. R. H. Thomas (Edith) of Niagara Falls who, with her family, and mother gave the departed every attention during the last fifteen months.

The funeral was held on Saturday, November 15th, from the residence of R. H. Thomas, 2287 Taylor street, Niagara Falls and was conducted by Rev. W. J. Walker of Drummond Hill Presbyterian Church. Interment in Fairview Cemetery. Beautiful floral tributes bore mute evidence of the esteem in which the departed, a stranger in the city, was held. The pallbearers were R. H. Thomas, A. M. Ewart, Albert Brantley, Ewart Thomas.
