Election Results

Artemesia
In Artemesia township on Monday the electors turned out fairly well and all candidates received good votes. Mr. J. A. Davis has been re-elected Deputy-Reeve as also Councilors W. Burnett and Garnet McGee with Mr. E. Warling of Vandeleur as the new man. The vote stood as follows:

Flesherston
The Councilors were re-elected in Flesherston by acclamation and the election there was for the Reeveship only. Mr. H. A. McCauley was elected over Mr. D. McTavish, the veteran Reeve, by 125 to 99. Mr. McCauley is a going man with ability and should be a valuable addition to the council at Flesherston and to the County Council.

Osprey
Mr. W. L. Taylor, Reeve of Osprey for several years, was defeated by Mr. Geo. Shortt, the vote being Taylor 376 Shortt 395. Mr. Wm. Heltman was elected Deputy-Reeve by a vote of 497 to 290 for his opponent, Mr. John Grummett. Messrs. R. J. Morrison, Jas. Monaghan and A. Wilton were elected as Councilors.

Charged with Hunting Deer

Charges against three young men from Sinton Park for hunting deer in that locality were heard before Magistrate Spearman at Dundalk on Wednesday last and attracted wide interest. In addition to the charges against the three for hunting deer three other charges were tried against one of the accused, namely, allowing his dog to run deer, being in possession of a loaded gun in a car and being unlawfully in possession of a muskrat skin. On the latter charges he pleaded guilty and the trial proceeded on the remaining four charges.

The Provincial Game Warden based his charges on the fact that he caught a dog in close pursuit of a deer which he subsequently identified as belonging to one of the accused, that the three accused were hunting in the swamp where deer was being run, and that on their return he found them in possession of two shot guns and a 30-30 deer gun. The defendants established an alibi and gave a satisfactory explanation for the presence of the rifle with a result that the owner of the dog was allowed off on suspended sentence and the other charges dismissed.

Crown Attorney C. S. Cameron, K.C., represented the Crown and I. E. Lucas Jr. acted on behalf of the three accused.
