The Village Council will meet on Monday next, Dec. 15th, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to wind up the business for the year. Those having accounts against the village should present them to the Clerk previous to the time of the meeting.

Mr. Wm. Irving of the East Backline, Artemesia, lost his barn and most of the contents on Thursday evening of last week. The fire was the result of the explosion of a lantern. There is some insurance but not nearly sufficient to cover the loss.

The Women's Association of Cooke's Presbyterian Church will hold a bazaar and bake sale in Knott's shop, next to King's grocery, on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 13th. Plain and fancy sewing will be offered for sale. This is a good opportunity to secure your Christmas gifts. The winner of the fruit cake will be made known at 4 p.m. on Saturday.

The time for the Christmas treat for the inmates of the House of Refuge given annually under the auspices of the W.C.T.U. is at hand. Any contributions of oranges, grapes and candy, small fancy cakes or Christmas cake will be appreciated. Gifts may be left at Mrs. Noble's shop or at Mrs. Leslie's store before Thursday, Dec. 18th, when the presentation will be made.

With the defeat of Mr. W. L. Taylor, for a number of years Reeve of Osprey, the big chair in the County Council is looked on as being within reach of several of the members who have already been re-elected in the early elections. Mr. T. J. Brodie, Reeve of Glenelg, is one of those in line for the honor. It is a great many years since the municipality has had the honor of being the home of the Warden and Mr. Brodie is well qualified to fill the position with profit to the County and honor to himself. Here's hoping that Tom may be the choice of his fellow councillors.

At the public meeting held on Thursday evening of last week in the Department of Agriculture officers were appointed to look after the affairs of the hockey club during the season. A team will be entered in the Senior N.H.L. series. The committee to look after the management of the Santa Claus Day was selected and already they have completed all arrangements and full particulars are given in a large adv. in this issue. The unemployment situation was discussed and it was decided to ask the Village Council to have the County Engineer make an estimate as to the cost of the drainage work necessary before pavements are laid with the idea of having the work done during the winter months and thus provide employment for a number of men who will otherwise be idle. It was hoped that fifty per cent of the cost would be taken care of by the Government's unemployment fund. The County Engineer was in town on Saturday but took no levels and there has been no further move in the matter. Drainage is absolutely necessary before pavements are laid and the work during the winter months would help the laboring men in the village very materially. Some move should be made at once.
