The late Mr. Minnis was unmarried and is survived by one brother, Mr. Kennedy Minnis of Arnott. The funeral will take place on Thursday, Jan. 1st from the home of his brother at Arnott to the Presbyterian Church cemetery at Chatsworth.

George Binnie

Another of the pioneer outstanding men of the township of Glenelg passed away at his home on the second concession north of the Durham Road last Thursday night after nearly one year's illness.

The late Mr. Binnie was born in Roxboroughshire, Scotland, in 1850 and when 11 years of age came with his parents to Canada and settled on the 2nd concession of Glenelg, the deceased subsequently purchasing in the seventies the farm on which he has resided ever since.
