#### C. P. R. Passenger Trains May be Changed

An important change in the routing of the Canadian Pacific passenger trains between Owen Sound and Toronto in the Grey and Bruce Division is, according to reliable information under consideration at present by the officials of the road, with the possibility that an announcement may be made within a short time. It is understood that this matter has been discussed on a number of occasions, but without results.

The change contemplated will eliminate a number of the stations between Orangeville and West Toronto, as instead of passing through Weston on the northward trip the train will continue straight through on the main line to Streetsville Junction, n that point Meadowvale, Churchville, Brampton, Snelgrove, Cheltenham, Inglewood, Forks of Credit, Cataract and Alton, and connecting with the lines in use at present at Melville, the first station south of Orangeville.
