Annesley Mission Circle

The True Bide Mission Circle of Annesley United Church met at the home of Mrs. Hare, the Superintendent of the Circle, on Friday, Jan. 16th.
The meeting was opened with the hymn, "Work for the Night is Coming", after which Miss W. Patterson led in prayer.
Miss Vera Magee, the President, who had charge of the meeting, read the Scripture Lesson—Hebrews 12: 1-7.
The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.
It was decided to order the Study Book, "Fruits of Christian Missions in Japan".
Then followed the appointment of members to give a review of a chapter of the Study Book for each meeting. The President will take charge of the Devotional part of each of the meetings.
Miss E. Hawken, Missionary on furlough, gave a very interesting and helpful talk about the Ukrainian girls. She first read from the Gospel of St. Luke, the story of the Good Samaritan, and then showed how the Ukrainian was our neighbor, and that we should love our neighbor. She said that if the foreigner could meet only the good Canadian we would have very little trouble with them. The real problem began when the Ukrainian and the English came into the country. The Ukrainians are a religious people. They have their own church, the Orthodox Church, but the services are foreign and very formal. She explained the Orthodox Church and what it means to the young people. The young people understand very little of the service and so are drifting away from their own church, and some are becoming atheistic. The W.M.S. have recognized the need of the young people and have started schools. The main thing taught in these schools is Christian living. She said it was a pleasure to teach the Ukrainians. She told about the marriage conditions. Girls are given in marriage when about 15 years of age. Before the Christian religion came in there was hardly a girl of fifteen unmarried, but now there are many as old as twenty-five and not married. Miss Hawken asked that the Circle remember this work and pray for it.
A vote of thanks was given to Miss Hawken for her very interesting talk.
Miss Jean Boyd favoured the meeting with a solo, "Abide with Me".
Miss Vera Magee closed the meeting with the benediction.
Mrs. Hare, assisted by Miss Dorothy Hare, served lunch.

MacDonald, secretary of board; sanitary inspectors as follows, Div. 1, H. H. MacDonald; Div. 2, Henry Beaton; Div. 3, R. J. Torry; Div. 4, John Ellison; Div. 5, T. J. Brodie; meetings of Board of Health to be held during 1931 on Feb. 14, May 2, Aug. 1, Nov. 14 at 2 p.m. Frank Meagher was reappointed as weed inspector for the whole township at 35 cents per hour and mileage of 10 cents, one way. Applications for assessing township for 1931 were received from Geo. A. McClung, Neil McArthur, Frederick G. Cook, W. G. Firth, Cunningham Moore, Robert G. Peart, Cameron Robson. Robert Peart was appointed assessor at salary of \$90.00.
By-law No. 735 authorizes the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow certain sums of money required for current year on credit of municipality. The Reeve and Clerk were authorized by resolution to sign the petition for statutory grant on the monies spent on township roads and bridges in 1930 and submit the same to the Minister of Highways of Ontario as provided for by Provincial statute, said expenditures amounting to the sum of \$14,526.50.

Wilson & Co., re insurance of township roads; Plaxton, Huceton & Co. re insurance; Bell Telephone Co. requesting permission of council to trim trees on second concession E.G. R.
The Road Superintendent presented voucher No. 1, for road improvements amounting to \$86.31 which was accepted and payments made accordingly. MacDonald, for registering 1 marriage, 13 births and 18 deaths in 1930 \$8.00; telephoning 50c; John McKechnie (Glencoadin) for extra time and mileage as school attendance officer in 1930 \$5.00; Treasurer, town of Durham, debenture tax re T. Young property \$25.50; do, Division Court fees for 1930 (Glencoadin share) \$9.50; Markdale Standard printing 1930 Treasurer's statement and tax notices \$146.75; McFadden Drug store, supplies for treasurer \$12.20; the treasurer, exchange on cheques, postage and excise stamps \$9.48.
