Approximately 29,000 people living in Canada are shareholders in the Canadian Pacific Railway, their number having been increased by over ten thousand during the past year. Many of these are employees of the company, while a large percentage of them are small investors who have bought a few shares with an idea of safety and profitably employing their surplus capital.

On January 15, 1931, the city of Lethbridge, Alberta, was made a point of call on the air mail route operating between Winnipeg and Calgary. Lethbridge is a point of considerable potential importance as the probable point from which the air line to the Pacific Coast will commence. Official surveys by technical officers of the Canadian Government Civil Aviation Branch have definitely indicated the route from Lethbridge as the most feasible passage of the Rocky Mountains.

Operating on an equal footing with the fastest system in the world, the Canadian Pacific Quotation Service installed by the Canadian Pacific Telegraphs was officially opened with the New Year and places Winnipeg second to none among the world's brokerage centres. Practically perfect operation of upwards of 80 tape ticker machines, carrying their news with lightning speed, beating all previous records by a wide margin, is announced by W. M. Thompson, manager, western lines, Canadian Pacific Telegraphs.

An official report shows that at the end of November last, there were 446,676 licensed radios in Canada or about one for every 22 of the population. Ontario leads with 228,487 sets and Quebec next with 81,033. Toronto leads all Canadian cities with 71,143 sets and in western Canada Vancouver tops the list with 17,330 with Winnipeg next with 16,252. It is only ten years since the first programme was broadcast by radio.

Among foodstuffs taken from the sea, the Indians on the coast of British Columbia put seaweed as worth adding to the menu of an epicurean, and in earlier days it was used among them as money also. On the Atlantic Coast of Canada some use has been made of seaweed, in combination with fish oil, in producing fish meal which is a valuable stock food.

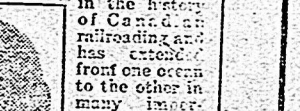

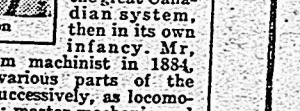
Retirement Closes 53 Years' Service

Over 53 years ago, a 14-year-old boy, joined the old Toronto Grey and Bruce Railway, as an apprentice in the Motive Power Department. Today, the retirement of Robert Preston, superintendent of motive power, Eastern Lines, Canadian Pacific Railway, closes a career which is something of an era in the history of Canadian railroading and has extended to the other end of the Dominion many important appointments. Standing his act as service with the C.P.R. as soon as the G. and B. was taken over by the great Canadian system, in his own infancy, Mr. Preston, from machinist in 1884, served in various parts of the Dominion, successively, as locomotive foreman, master mechanic and superintendent of motive power on both Western and Eastern Lines. He intends to make his home in Toronto, where he is well known and has many friends. He is succeeded by George Whitely, who has been his assistant since 1915 and also has a long record in the service of the company, having started as fireman at Fort William, Ont., in 1902. His employment in various posts of the Motive Power Department, however, has taken him all over the Prairie and Eastern Canada.

The post of assistant superintendent of motive power on Eastern Lines will be filled by Alexander Peers, who leaves his appointment as master mechanic of the British Columbia



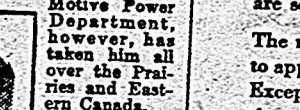

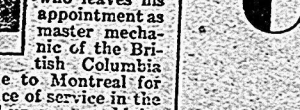

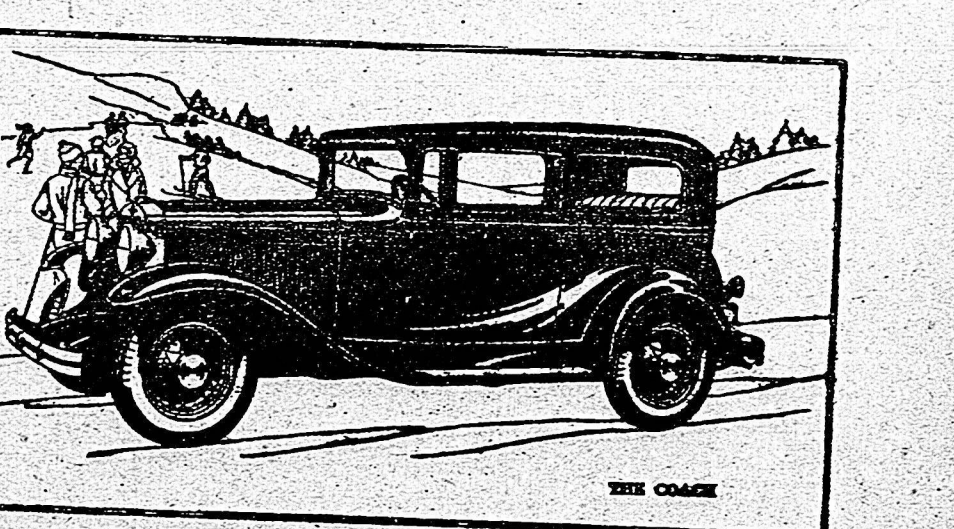
