Mr. and Mrs. W. Frizzell of Bogor visited on Monday with the latter's aunt, Mr. and Mrs. F. Olmstead.

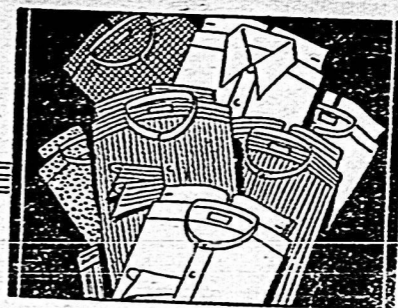
Miss Mary Acheson entertained a few select friends last Tuesday evening when euchre was the main pastime.
