Markdale Wins In Fiesher-ton

On Friday night while the High School kids were entertaining the Dundalk ditto, the seniors took a ride down to Fiesher-ton again to in-spect Mr. Akit's "match box" and incidentally entertain those on the in-side to an exhibition of Canada's national pastime.

The first period produced some real snappy hockey with Markdale having a slight edge on the play. The visitors secured the first goal when White propelled one past Snell and apparently everyone in the house saw it but the umpire who was either asleep or paralyzed, at any rate he forgot to put his hand up and every-one was standing around waiting for him to do so when Singleton grabbed the puck again and bulged the twine just as the official came to.

The second session saw some more good hockey with play being fairly evenly divided between the two aggregations. However the Fiesher-ton boys were aimed a bit more ac-curately and Harold McCutcheon rifled one past Wright to put his team on even terms.

So far as hockey was concerned, the last period was a washout with play zig zagging from one end to the other. First one team would bottle their opponents up behind their blue line and then the defending team would hoist the disc up to the other end of the "box" and then the other team would duplicate the play. It was on one of these occasions when Markdale had been defending and had shot to the orange and black end that the black and white pulled out in front to stay. Beard followed the puck and when he got up there he found McTavish having a little "fete-a-fete" with the "black bis-cuit." Beard thought he'd like to be in on it too, so he grabbed a hold of it with his stick and relieved McTavish of it and when he had finished with it he passed it over to Snell to play with but he wasn't in the mood so let it go into the case.

The game ended 2-1 for Markdale and as goals counted the local boys feel fairly safe, but not too much so as the Fiesher-ton crew have already trounced them in their own back-yard and have a real good team. The return game is in the Markdale arena on Tuesday evening, Feb. 11th.

Fiesher-ton Wins Round in Overtime

Seven games were required be-tween Markdale and Fiesher-ton to settle the winner of their half of the group in the Senior Northern League, each team winning three and tying one. Total goals for the seven games show Markdale three ahead of their rivals, but still the round goes to our Southern Neighbours, and void of any hard feelings.

I wasn't at the game on Tuesday Eve., being at home with lumbago in a wisdom tooth, but I've been talking to several of the fans, including a lot of fellows who could have played a better game if they had been out there with a club in their hands and a lot of fellows who would like to be coaching the local team and make something out of them, but if they were offered the job would either make a mess of it or decline the offer with thanks. Also "Mr. C. R. Hch" told me that Freddie McCutcheon scored Markdale's only goal.

Well, according to the review of the game as related to me by the sev-eral railbirds, it was only a fair ex-hibition of the game which lays claim to be the fastest in the world and also the National Game of "Our Lady of the Snows." The Homesteaders went into the game with a one goal lead on the round and were slight favor-ites for the game, since they had won their last two games by a margin of 7 to 2. However they must have de-veloped a case of overconfidence for they didn't play as good a game as on their last two appearances. Play was about even for the first period and neither team seemed to be able to get their guns working, with the re-sult that no "bills eyes" were made.

The black and white opened the scoring in the second period when McCutcheon whisked one into the corner of Snell's cage from the right boards. That put the boys up two on the round, and when the period ended they looked fairly safe, but not too much so with Fiesher-ton al-ways pressing.

The third canto saw Fiesher-ton come from behind to score two rather fluke goals, the first being deflected off White's stick into the opposite corner to which it was originally labeled and the other catching Bev. Johnston on the chest, not giving Wright a chance. Nuhn got credit for both of them.

When the final alarm sounded Fiesher-ton had the game in the bag and, as goals counted on the round had it tied at three all, and it looked like another game. However the teams agreed to settle it there and then and so stepped out on the ice

for overtime. The deciding counter was just after the teams changed ends for the second five minutes of overtime when Gorrell poked one in behind Wright.

It was a tough game to lose, but on the play the visitors deserved to win. The local team can contribute their defeat to poor combination and failure to bore in on the goal. Pen-alties were about evenly divided and were mostly for minor infringements of the rules.

On one occasion referee Saunders provided a laugh when he failed to get out of the way of the play and Singleton knocked him flying. "Bob-by" took it all good naturedly and sat on the ice until the play was com-pleted and he could make a complete recovery. Just before the final gong Singleton was knocked out when he got the butt end of his own stick poked into his stomach when coming in contact with the boards.

And so our hopes of winning the N. H. L. Senior Championship have vanished. We are all satisfied that, if it wasn't the best team that won, at least it was the best team that lost, and the Markdale fans wish to con-gratulate the winners and wish them the best of luck in their efforts to land the cup, emblematic of the cham-pionship of the Senior N. H. L.

Markdale scored the first goal in the first minute of play when Alton shot from left wing and Warren took the rebound from the boards and passed over to T. D. Berry who shot and then scored on the rebound.

Half a minute later Dundalk developed a case of "Stage Fright" and pushed one into their own goal in trying to clear from a face-off beside the net. After that both teams settled down and finished the period with-out any more tallies although the M. H. S. boys had the best of the play.

In the second spasm the locals got two. We couldn't follow the play on the first one for the maze of sticks behind the Dundalk blue line, but somebody said that Alton pulled the trigger for that one. The other came a couple of minutes later when Noble rushed from his own blue line and beat the whole Dundalk team. Dundalk made up for their "gift" when one of their boys grabbed the puck from under Dundalk's pads in a scramble in front of the net near the close of the period.

The next address of the evening was given by Mr. W. L. Young, who spoke briefly of Scotland, the land of his birth, and of his youthful days in Canada. As a complement to this Mr. G. A. Beaton sang "Roamin' in the Gloamin'" the subject on which Mr. F. McNab, principal of the High School, spoke was the "Army and Navy." This was followed by "The Red, White and Blue" by the quar-tette.

The closing address and also one of the best in the program was given by Mr. Aubrey Foster, whose sub-ject, "Sowing and Reaping," had a wide scope and a helpful application to life. All present who had been on the farm or were then living on the farm were asked to stand and join in singing two verses of "Bring-ing in the Sheaves." Mrs. W. J. McFadden played the piano accompani-ment. Only a very few in the audi-ence were left sitting. Mr. J. H. Dan-das, in his usual finished style, was accompanist for the quartette.
