Ideal winter weather. Mrs. D. Lee attended the funeral of her aunt, Mrs. Wellwood, at Brampton last week.

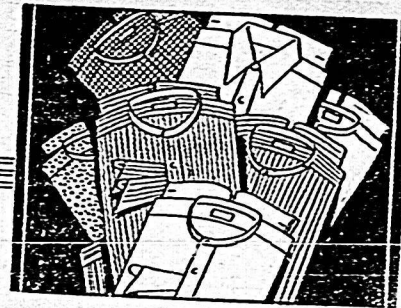
Miss Daisy Baker of Cherry Grove is spending a few months with Mrs. Hill.
