Hydro Snow Cars Delivered

R. Down, the local Ford agent, has had the contract this winter of building snow cars for the Hydro Electric Power Commission. On Thursday last five were delivered, two to the local division, and one each to the South Falls, Waubaushene and Allandale divisions. The cars, which are built on a Model A Ford chassis, considerably remodeled, are capable of traversing the winter roads in this part of the country, and the remarkable mobility of these machines is of marked assistance, reducing the possibilities of a break in the service for any length of time, to a minimum.

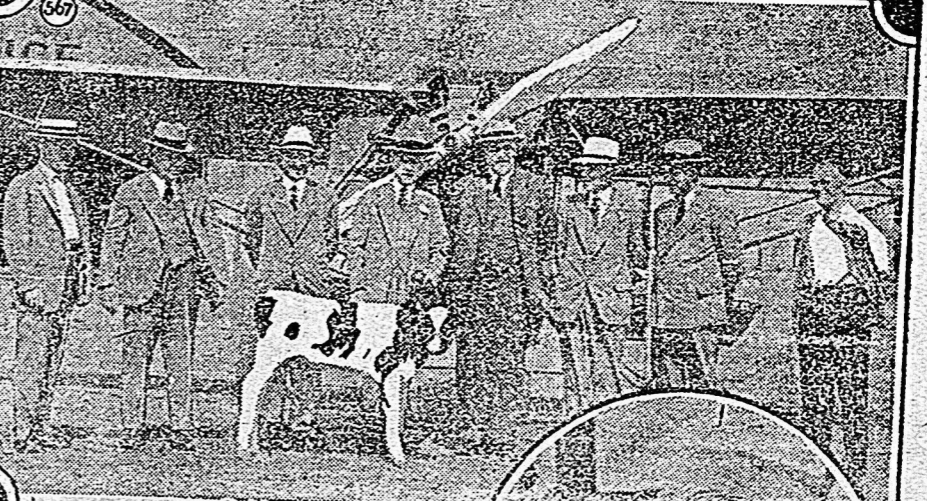
British Badminton Team
