MARKDALE LOCAL NEWS

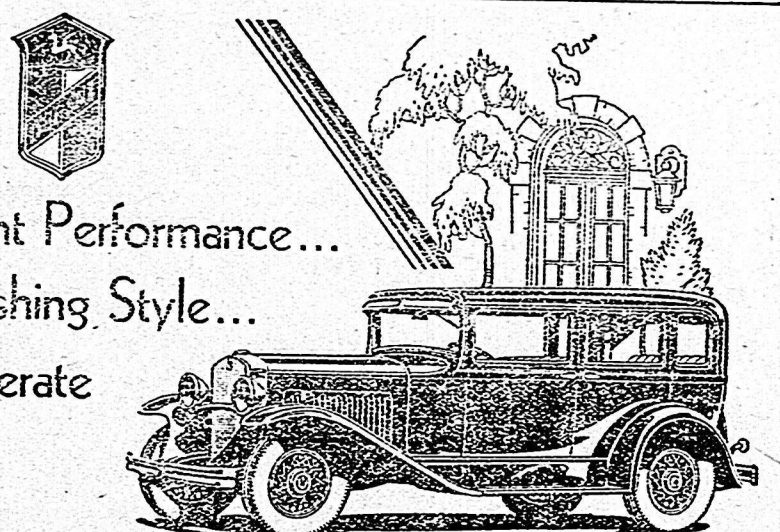
