

The Ontario Weed Control Act

Clause 3-Every occupant of land, Clause 3—Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner, shall destroy all weeds designated noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to provent the ripening of their seeds.

seeds.

Clause 6—In the absence of any owner or occupier or upon refusal after notice to comply with the requirements of the Weed Control Act, the Inspector may cause weeds coming under this act to be cut down and destroyed and may charge the cost of such work against the property to be collected in the same manner as taxes.

NOXIOUS WEEDS—Bladder campion, ox-eye daisy, sow thistles, white cockle, wild oats, Canada thistle, blue weed, chicory, ribgrass, docks, common ragweed, hawk-


