Judging Competition

The annual Grey County Judging Competition was held here on Friday afternoon, June 19th, when 126 boys from all parts of the County and 72 girls took part. Farmers from the nearby district supplied the stock for the boys which included poultry, horses, beef cattle, sheep and swine. Previous to the judging of livestock the boys wrote an examination on practical agriculture and classes of girls wrote on the subjects of Nutrition, House Furnishing and Clothing.

The judges for the boys event were Mr. James Telfer, Dominion Livestock Branch at Paris, Ont., Mr. W. G. Michael, Dominion Seed Branch, Harriston; Mr. Fred Forsythe, Agricultural Representative of Bruce County, Mr. Ramsbottom, Assistant Agricultural Representative of Dufferin County, Mr. H. L. Atkinson, Assistant from the Department of Agriculture, Huron County. The girls' judges were Miss Florence Edie of the Institute Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, and Miss Banbridge of Dutton and Miss Row of Curries.

Miss E. Zavitz and Miss E. J. Cowan, who have been coaching the girls in the various districts of the county, were also present and assisted at the competition.

At the conclusion of the competition the young people attended a banquet which was held in the basement of the Annesley United Church and provided for by the Ladies' Aid of that church. The Grey County Council also attended the affair at which over 170 were present. Mr. T. Stewart Cooper, Agricultural Representative of Grey County, presided as toastmaster. The toast to the King was responded to by the National Anthem with Miss Alice Frizell of Bognor at the piano. The toast to the Junior Farmers and the Junior Institute was proposed by A. V. Langton, assistant agricultural representative of Grey County and was responded to by W. J. Lynn, president of the Junior Farmer's Club of Meaford, Miss Grimm, president of the Junior Women's Institute at Ayton, Miss M. Abercrombie, president of the Junior Women's Institute at Meaford and Mr. D. Grein, president of the Junior Farmers at Ayton.

The toast to the County Council was proposed by Mr. T. Stewart Cooper and responded to by Warden White of Hepworth and Allan Bell, Reeve of Durham. To the judges was proposed by Miss Cowan and Miss E. Zavitz and ably responded to by Miss F. Eadie, Mr. Banberry and Mr. Michael. Rev. At the conclusion of the toasts the prizes won by the young people in the judging competition during the day were distributed. In the boy's section William Martin of Walters Falls won for the highest number of points. Cuff links were presented to Bob McDonald of Dundalk for poultry, Leonard Shouldice of Shallow Lake for horses, Norman Shouldice of Shallow Lake for beef cattle, Douglas Hammond, Thornbury, for dairy cattle, Henry Ford, Owen Sound No. 3, for sheep and Wallace Halliday, Mount Forest, No. 3, for swine.

In the girls' division the winners were presented with silver dishes. They were Alice Frizell for high girl, Beulah Atkins of Heathcote, second; Wilma Edmonstone of Kemble, third. In Nutrition, Nettie Abercrombie, Markdale No. 3, Helen Taylor, Kemble. In House Furnishing, Edna Vamplew, Heathcote and Mary Martin, Walters Falls. In Clothing, Sylva Theakston, Heathcote and Mary McKinnon, Chesley.

The competition was the largest of any held in the province so far this year. At the conclusion of the affair a dance was enjoyed by the young people until 12 o'clock. Music was supplied by Bognor orchestra.

The next convention will be held in Flesherston in June 1932.

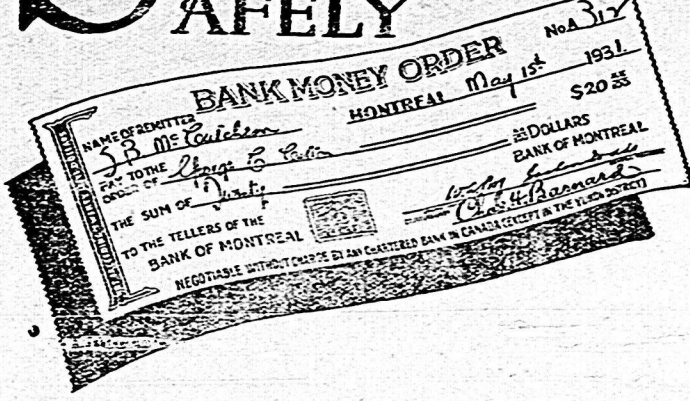
