Draws Jubilee Pay Cheque A new railway record, a differ one, was established on May 28th. when John Cassar of 5947 Yew St. called at the Canadian Pacific Railway offices for his pay chequejubilee cheque, recognizant of his Sinty years of continual railway ser vice in Canada, most of which has been with the Canadian Pacific.
