### Sons of Temperance

He has a better "cloak for his sin" than under prohibition.

Hence it cuts down the demand for them and people are thrown out of work in the factories and other places of work. Those of us who said yes to the L.C.A. (does it control) took a terrible responsibility on ourselves, the responsibility for the ruin and suffering of the men, women, boys and girls, who are drinking. What did you do at the last election and what are you going to do at the next?
