

Joseph Lund Dead

Mr. Joseph Lund, a former postmaster and general merchant at Berkeley, passed away at Ontario, Calif., on Saturday, July 11th. The deceased resided at Berkeley for over 20 years where he and Mrs. Lund were active members of the Methodist Church and assisted in the erection of the church building. Mr. Lund was superintendent of the Sunday School and Mrs. Lund was organist in the church. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary four years ago. The following taken from the local paper at Ontario gives the particulars in connection with his death and funeral: Joseph Lund old time resident of Ontario, brother of Councilman A. E. Lund, passed away at the family residence, 205 West B street, Saturday last. He was nearly 77 years of age, and had enjoyed wonderfully good health up to a few months before he died. He had always eaten heartily, worked hard and enjoyed life, making friends of all those around him. He was a very kind man at home and did favors wherever he could. He had lived in Ontario for over fifteen years. Funeral services were held Monday at Draper's with Rev. C. O. Kimball, of the First Methodist church, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Pearce of Eagle Road. Deceased leaves his wife, one son, J.F. Lund, of 1047 North Laurel avenue and one brother, A. B. Lund, in Ontario, besides one brother and one sister elsewhere. He also leaves various other relatives. The community loses a valuable citizen in the death of Mr. Lund.

Markdale Council

The members were all present and the Reeve presided at the regular meeting of the Village Council held Monday evening. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. On motion of Mr. J. R. Dillon, seconded by Mr. A. W. Sproule, the treasurer was authorized to make the following payments: Bell Telephone Co., telephone at pumping station, \$4.30; Jos. McClung, cutting weeds, \$10.00; Norman Levi, cutting weeds, \$7.00; Amos McClung, work at fire hall, \$3.00; R. G. Noble, supplies for streets, \$13.50; Marshall Beard, meals for vagrants, \$1.00; The Municipal World, register, \$4.30; C. Alton, salary \$75.00.

On motion of Messrs. Sproule and Dillon it was decided to construct curb and gutter from the Bank of Toronto property on Main street to the Mercer corner and from the Library lane to Queen Street.

Mr. J. R. Dillon was given permission to put in a tank on Main Street opposite the drive at the Lucas and Jackson garage.

On motion of Messrs. Stewart and Borinsky it was decided to allow no more gas tanks or gas pumps on the streets in the village, and those already in use will be charged a yearly rental of \$25.00 each.

Messrs. Stewart and Borinsky were also responsible for the motion ordering the owners of gas tanks to have them lowered to the necessary depth in order to not interfere with the paving operations. The council adjourned after some discussion regarding the paving work.

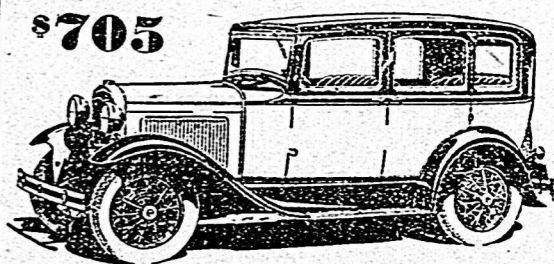
