**Owen Sound Boys Steal Sheep**

(Orangeville Sun)  
Six sheep and two rams travelling 'de luxe' from Owen Sound to Snelgrove in a sedan, was responsible for Russell King, Robert Price and Whitney Goodfellow, three Owen Sound youths, spending the night in the Brampton jail Monday night.

The car is said to have broken down with its mixed passengers as it approached Snelgrove, and one resident who happened to pass by became suspicious when he discovered the nature of the cargo, and telephoned the Brampton police.

Hurrying to the spot, Chief Herkes and Provincial Officer H. T. Owens found the three men working on the car. Examination, however, revealed no sheep or rams, although the rear of the car readily suggested, it is declared, they had been passengers for a considerable distance.

On being questioned, King, the driver, told Chief Herkes that the animals had been taken out and sent on to Toronto by truck. Not satisfied with their story, an officer set out along the Dundas highway in pursuit of the truck, which was overtaken at Cooksville.

After communicating with the Owen Sound authorities, Chief Herkes said he learned that the trio were wanted on a charge of stealing the animals, and are now being held pending the arrival of an officer to escort them back to Owen Sound to face trial.

**Practical Help**

(Written for the Grain Trade News by a former Orange Valley boy, Mr. R. G. Beattie, now of Toronto.)

That the operators of country elevators are anxious and willing to give practical help in solving the problems of the producers is again demonstrated in the offer made to the Saskatchewan Government by the Northwest Grain Dealers' Association, an outline of which appears elsewhere in this issue. The Association is evidently anxious to have the fullest use made of its facilities, in order to collect and distribute feed and seed grain in needy areas on the most economical basis possible. This is far from being a suddenly conceived idea arising out of present conditions. The members of the Northwest Grain Dealers' Association have all along been mindful of the needs of the producers, as their records plainly show. It may be mentioned, as an example, that back in January all elevator agents controlled by members of the Association were notified in the plainest terms that the producers' interests were to be furthered in the matter of providing them with higher grade and better quality grain, thus helping to ensure a good crop of the best quality. Steps were outlined at this time, whereby elevators were enabled to exchange high quality grain, where available, for lower quality grain delivered by the producers. It is to be noted that no charge was enforced, apart from the actual difference in price of the grades exchanged and this could be taken care of by delivery of additional amounts of the lower grades. The present proposal is a broadening out of earlier efforts in helping the producer. It shows, what has always been maintained, that the interests of the producers and those concerned in marketing grain, must be considered as one, if the best results are to be obtained. In the present emergency, the efforts of the Association cannot fail to meet with general approval.

**Aid to Producer Freely Extended by Grain Trade**

Northwest Grain Dealers' Association Makes Practical Offer to Saskatchewan Govt. (Grain Trade News)

Keenly alive to the situation of the producers, particularly in the drought areas of Saskatchewan, the Northwest Grain Dealers' Association has made very definite proposals to the Saskatchewan government to facilitate the handling of relief seed and feed grain.

The basis of the proposal and its objectives are outlined in the following statement:

"A delegation from the Northwest Grain Dealers' Association composed of R. G. Beattie of the North Star Grain Company Limited, and president of the Association, D. N. Potter of the Searle Grain Co., Ltd., and G. A. Lawrence of the Federal Grain Limited, interviewed the Minister of the Provincial Department of Agriculture at Regina, on Monday and Tuesday, July 20th and July 21st, relative to the handling of relief seed and feed grain throughout the Province.

"This delegation, representing members of the Association operating approximately two thousand country elevators in the province, informed the Minister they were authorized to offer their elevator organization and facilities, for collecting and distributing on the most economical basis possible, feed and seed grain where needed in the province.

"The Minister was also informed that at points where all elevators are now closed, that one or more elevators could be available at a very nominal rental, for the storage and distribution of grain.

"In order to expedite the operation of the plan the Association is prepared to place a capable and experienced representative in Regina, at their expense, who will have all information as to location and description of available stocks of grain, with instructions to render every possible assistance to the government.

"R. G. Beattie, President of the Association, stated that the elevator operators are fully informed through their country representatives of the situation confronting the farmers in the drought area, and are prepared and anxious to render the government and producers every assistance possible."

**Decency Being Insulted Upon The Town Streets**

We observe that the Government has been forced to take action against a certain sect in the Western provinces in order that the common laws of decency may be enforced and it is beginning to look as though some stricter measures will have to be adopted in Ontario to regulate the action of certain tourists who apparently take delight in making themselves offensive to many people in towns which they have occasion to visit. This peculiar trait of character appears to have advanced considerably this season, and as far as Midland is concerned it appears about time the municipal authorities stepped in and called a halt. There is a certain class of individual and they are grown up men, who have delegated to themselves the idea that they have a right to parade the main street of the town with nothing more covering their form than a scanty bathing suit and in some cases less than that. If these smart Alexes were to venture out upon the streets of Toronto or any other city it would not be long before Chief Draper's men or others would be tapping them upon the shoulder and telling them to go home and put some clothes on or take the risk of being run into the cooler. These costumes are had enough to tolerate on the bathing beaches, but they have no right upon the main street of this or any other town, and they should be politely told so by the police.
