#### Owen Sound Boys Steal Sheep

Six sheep and two rams travelling de luxe' from Owen Sound to Snelfor Russell King, Robert Price and Whitney Goodfellow, three Owen Sound youths, spending the night in the Brampton jail Monday night.

The car is said to have broken down with its mixed passengers as it approached Snelgrove, and one resident who happened to pass by became suspicious when he discovered the nature of the cargo, and

telephoned the Brampton police. Hurrying to the spot, Chief Herk es and Provincial Officer H. T. Owens found the three men working revealed no sheep or rams, although the rear of the car readily suggested, it is declared, they had been passengers for a considerable distance.

On being questioned, King, the driver, told Chief Herkes that the animals had been taken out and sent on to Toronto by truck. Not satisfied with their story, an officer set out along the Dundas highway in pursuit of the truck, which was ov ertaken at Cooksville.

After communicating with the Owen Sound authorities, Chief Herkes said he learned that the trio were wanted on a charge of stealing pending the arrival of an officer to escort them back to Owen Sound to face trial.
