By-law No. 740 was read a third time and passed providing for the repeal of By-laws No. 692 and 729, and provides that on all taxes paid on or before Dec. 1st, 1931, a discount of 2 per cent be given. 2nd. that 3 per cent. be added to all taxes remaining unpaid after January 1st, 1932. 3rd. that 5 per cent be added to all taxes remaining unpaid after Feb. 1st, 1932.

McGirr - McKechnie - That this council tender the clerk, sisters and brother a vote of sympathy in the loss of their father, the late John A. MacDonald.—Carried.

By-law No. 741, providing for levies to meet current expenditure was passed. General rates being as follows for 1931, County rate 11 6-10 mills, township rate, 6 5-10, general school rate 5 8-10 mills. Council adjourned to October 10, at 10 a.m.
