Ontario gold production for the half year to June 30 reached \$20,-608;195, the greatest on record. Indications are that the output for the full year 1931 will be well over \$41,000,000 in value.

Working at the rate of a mile a day and employing a daily average of 450 men, completion of rockballasting in the Ontario district from Windsor to Smiths Falls on the Canadian Pacific tracks was announced recently.

Canadian hens are working much harder than their ancestors of ten years ago. In 1920, statistics show that 6010 birds produced an average of 122.1 eggs apiece. This average rose steadily until in 1930 it was 178 eggs per bird.
