

Grey County Championship School Fair

Three thousand, five hundred to four thousand people including Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture; Mr. Victor Porteous, M.P. for North Grey; Miss Agnes Macphail, M.P. for South Grey; Mr. S. Charters, M.P. for Peel County and Mr. C. H. Reeve of the T. Eaton Co., Toronto, attended the fifth annual Championship School Fair held at Markdale last Saturday, Oct. 10th. It was one of the largest crowds ever seen in Markdale.

The exhibit in the Armouries was the largest ever displayed at any Grey County Championship School Fair. Every exhibit was declared by the Minister to be "Worthy of a first Prize". From the writing exhibits to the bank of bushel baskets of potatoes and 13 foot corn sheaves quality of the highest order was to be found.

Fifteen Rural Schools, 19 boys and 19 girls competed for honors in the Championship Public Speaking Contests and a similar number competed in the Solo contests. Fourteen school sections sent a chorus of 7 voices. These were children from all rural schools.

The High School girls and other ladies of Markdale made up a lunch which was served with tea free of charge at noon to those children coming from a distance.

Street Opening

The official opening of the new pavements in Markdale took place on Monday evening and was one of the most successful and pleasant events in the history of the village. There was a tremendous crowd in town for the celebration and all appeared to enjoy themselves in spite of the fact that they suffered considerably from the cold.

The first item on the program was a banquet held at the home of the Reeve, Mr. J. C. Mercer. The dinner was provided by the Reeve and Councillors and was served by their wives. Among those at the table were Warden Robt. White; Messrs. H. H. Thompson, Herb Corbett and W. H. Hunter, the County Roads Committee; Reeve McCauley and the Flesherston Council; Engineer Alder of Durham and Engineer Robert McKnight of Owen Sound; Mr. W. King and other representatives of the King Paving Co., several others from outside points and the village. Short addresses were given by Mr. W. D. Henry, who presided, Reeve Mercer, Reeve McCauley of Flesherston, Warden White, Mr. King, Mr. Alder, Mr. McKnight, Mr. Hunter, Dr. L. G. Campbell and others.

The official opening took place at the intersection of Main and Toronto Streets. Here Warden White cut the ribbon, which opened officially the two new pavements. Addresses were delivered by the Warden, Messrs. H. H. Thompson, Herb Corbett, W. H. Hunter, Dr. L. G. Campbell, Reeve Mercer, W. D. Henry and W. King. The addresses were short and to the point.

The street dance under the auspices of the local branch of the Canadian Legion was well conducted and well patronized. The Guelph Orchestra supplied good music for the round dancing and the Haw Orchestra of Swinton Park for the square dancing. In the drawing contest Merton Wiley won the radio; Earl Semple the gold watch; Robt. Peart the bag of sugar, John Murdoch of Durham the bag of flour and H. G. Burke of Peversham the sweater coat.

Markdale with its concrete pavements now presents a tidy and up-to-date appearance. The King Paving Co. have given the town a first class job and the pavements should last for a great many years. When the remainder of the streets are finished the village will be prepared to hold its own with the best of Ontario's villages.

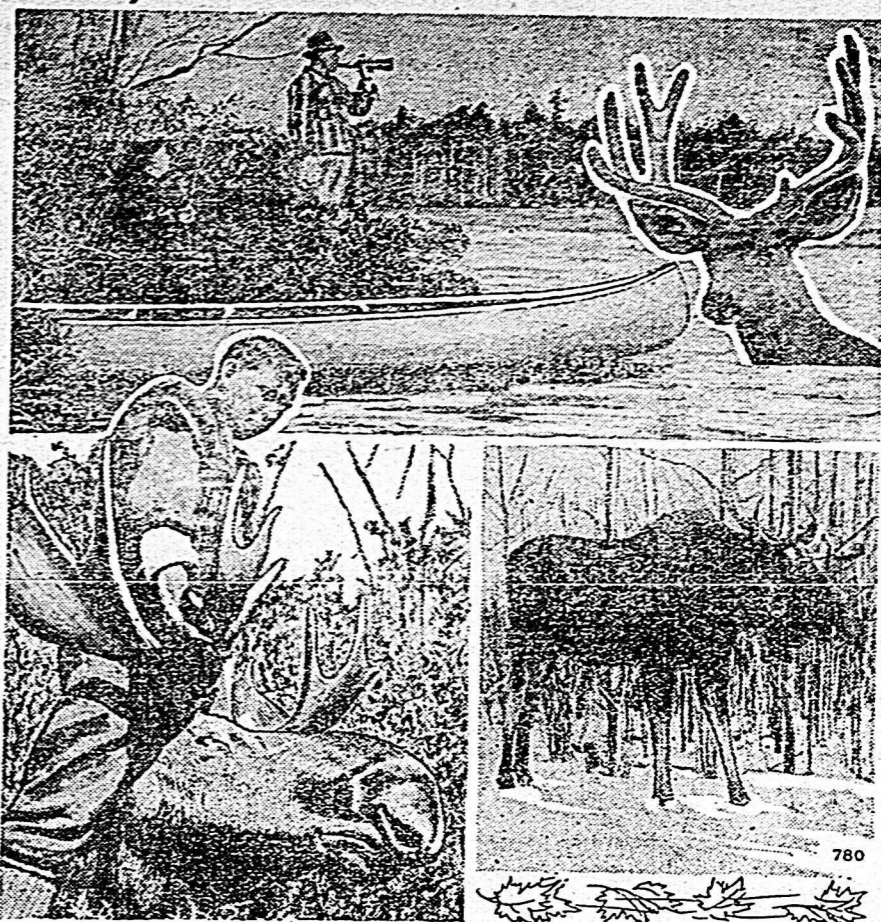
