Boys' and Girls' Sheep Club

A new Boys' and Girls' Sheep Club policy has been devised under the auspices of the Federal and Provincial Live Stock Branches which will supersede all previous Club policies. The main points are as follows:

At least 10 or more boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 20 who are prepared to purchase not less than 3 and not more than 10 grade or pure bred ewes, may form a club. The sheep must be all of one breed.

The Sires are supplied free of charge for two years. Individual club members or the agents appointed by them will be assisted if desired by representatives of either or both of the two departments in the selection and purchase of all ewes.

During the first year demonstrations in docking, castrating, shearing and dipping will be given. Educational meetings will be held from time to time as necessity advises in deal with management problems.

The Canadian Bankers' Association have agreed to support the policy by making advances to the members in connection with the purchase of breeding ewes.
