

### Poland Solves Question

of Surplus Farm Products Warsaw.—Poland, with 67 per cent. of its population on the land, has suffered far less from the world economic crisis than Germany and other heavily industrialized countries.

Prices of farm products have declined to such a degree that the in-come of farmers has been greatly reduced, but instead of selling their foodstuffs at low prices the farmers send them to unemployed relatives He worked. The government figures for unemployment vary from 250,000 to 300,000 or about 1 per cent. of the population But the actual number of unemployed is probably greater, as thousands have gone back to the farms yet never re sistered for the dole.
