The members of the Village Council were all present for the transaction of the business of the Markdale Hydro at the meeting held on Monday evening, Nov. 30th.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

On motion of Messrs. Sproule and Dillon the following accounts were ordered paid: Hydro Electric Power Commission, power for October, \$489.50, clearing wires for paving, \$7.00, trimming trees and inspecting fuses, \$12.44, repairing wires broken in paving, \$32.70, moving pole at Main corner, half cost, \$29.95; The Markdale Standard, billing forms, \$7.00; A. E. Colgan, postage on arrears, 54 cents; Village of Markdale, 1931 debenture, \$653.54; E. Hannah, work on George Street, \$2.00; W. Mann, bolts, 20 cents; W. Turney, half costs of securing material for traffic lights, \$2.95.
