## Fatally Injured When Struck By Car

To reach the good age of 82 years in good health, and then have to answer the final summons the victim of a motor accident, through no fault of her own, is tragic. Such is the case of Mrs. Hugh McLean of Lower Town, who on Saturday morning last in Durham hospital, breathed her last. She was brought there the evening before, the result of being knocked down by a car. With Mrs. Innes, Mrs. McLean was on her way to the Baptist Church to attend the revival services there. They were crossing the pavement in front of E. A. Rowe's bake shop and stepped onto the street waiting for a car to pass. As she did so, she was directly in front of a car approaching from the opposite direction and unseen by Mrs. McLean. It was driven by George Hahn and alleged to be going at a fast rate of speed. She was knocked down, suffering head injuries and had her leg broken in two places, above the knee and in the calf of the leg. The leg was otherwise badly bruised and mangled and from the first it was believed that her injuries would be fatal. She survived till 11 a.m. on Saturday.

The accident and later death, has caused universal expressions of regret in town for deceased lady was widely known and as highly respected. Since the death of her husband in 1926, she has lived in her own home in south of town, but during the winter months with members of her family here, who delighted to have her with them. She had remarked to Mr. J. H. Harding only recently, that she was going to stay in her own home this winter and was making preparations to that end. She delighted in her independence and frequently stated that she rarely, if ever, had been ill a day. Mrs. McLean was an admirable neighbor and friend and many a home has found comfort in her ministrations in times of sickness and sorrow. She was very fond of her church and was most regular in attendance at all its sessions. In other words she lived up to her convictions.

Previous to her marriage to Mr. McLean, deceased was Abigail Leopard, a well known name in early Egremont days. She was married 57 years ago and her husband predeceased her in 1926. Four sons and three daughters of the union survive: Donald, Seattle; Hugh of Galt; Jim and Robert of Durham; Mrs. G. A. Thompson of Durham; Mrs. W. J. Rabb of Harriston; Mrs. A. McFarlane of Durham.

The funeral was held Monday to Durham cemetery and was largely attended. Rev. J. T. Priest, her pastor, conducted the services at the house and grave, the pall bearers being Messrs. Hugh McLean, John Ritchie, Anthony Holmes, Arch. Baird, Geo. Thompson, Allan McFarlane—Durham Review.

## NOMINATIONS

**Euphrasia**  
There was a big gathering of electors in the little village of Rocklyn on Friday last, the attraction being the municipal nomination held that day in the Township Hall there. There were quite a number of names placed in nomination but some of them withdrew. At the close of the official nominations a meeting was held over which Mr. Wm. Wright presided and at which the Reeve and Councillors gave a review of the work of the Council in 1931. The new candidates also expressed their opinions regarding the questions affecting the municipality. Nine names will appear on the ballot, two for Reeve and seven for Councillors. Mr. W. H. Erskine, former Reeve, is opposing Mr. H. H. Thompson, the present Reeve. Messrs. J. A. Cook, J. A. Gilchrist, J. A. Halbert and H. E. Parker, the present Councillors are seeking re-election as well as three new men, Messrs. Robert James Bell, Robert David Carruthers, who has had several years experience in the Council, and John Alexander Wilson. The campaign promises to be an interesting one and the result will be in doubt until the last ballot is counted.

**Glenelg**  
While there was keen interest in the nomination meeting held the same day at the Township Hall in Glenelg Centre there was not so much desire expressed for a change as in Euphrasia township. Mr. Thos. J. Brodie was re-elected as Reeve. Others were nominated but withdrew. For the Council the present members, Messrs. John McGirr, John McKechnie, John Boyd and S. H. Wright, were nominated along with one new man, Mr. Nicholas Melosh. All qualified and there will be an election with five candidates for four positions.

**Artemesia**  
The new town hall at Flesherton proved too small to accommodate the crowd which gathered for the Artemesia nominations on Monday. Quite an interesting meeting was held over which Mr. T. R. McKenzie, ex-Warden of Grey, presided. Three were nominated for the position of Reeve, but Mr. Herb Corbett, the present incumbent of the office, retired and the scrap for the big chair will be between Mr. John Davis, the present Deputy-Reeve, and Mr. Alex. Cameron, a former Reeve. For the position of Deputy-Reeve four names were placed in nomination, namely Messrs. Garnet McGee, I. B. Whittaker, Wm. Burnett and Cecil Meldrum. The first two mentioned have qualified. For Councillors Messrs. Elmer Warring, Wm. Burnett and Cecil Meldrum have been elected by acclamation.

**Flesherton**  
The Flesherton nominations produced very little excitement and the present Reeve, Mr. H. A. McCauley, has been elected by acclamation, the members being Messrs. G. N. Richardson, G. B. Welton, F. Mathewson, and J. Dargavel.

## The National Temperance Study Course

The National Temperance Study Course for Sunday Schools, prepared by the Religious Education Council of Canada in co-operation with the Women's Christian Temperance Union and put on during the month of October, covered five lessons and was suited to two groups of pupils—those under 12 years and those 12 years of age and over. Those who obtained 50 and less than 65 marks out of a possible 100 are entitled to pass certificates and those who obtained 65 marks or over will receive honor certificates. The junior course was in story form and showed how boys and girls who used liquor or cigarettes were unfitted for winning out in sports, tests of skill or speed, as the heart, brain and muscles were affected thereby.

In the intermediate senior course the lives of five outstanding successful men were reviewed and their consensus of opinion was that the use of alcohol is decidedly injurious to all who want to think clearly and act wisely and is the cause of untold suffering and privation in the families of those who use it. The men chosen were Nansen, the explorer; Sir Wilfred T. Grenfell, Timothy Eaton, Dr. Charles Mayo and Sir Robert Falconer.

Seniors, Almada Myers, age 13, 88 marks; Bessie Lyons, 14 years, with 75 marks; Betty Carefoot, age 14 years, 89 and Bertha Boyd, age 12 years, 67.

Juniors, Helen Carefoot, age 11 years, 100 or full marks; Mary Carefoot, age 10 years, 100; Isabel Boyd, age 11 years, 89.

The judges were: The Gospel Worker's Sunday School, Rev. A. Mills and Miss Wright; Annesley United Sunday School, Miss Henry, Mrs. Cara Wiley and Miss M. McLoughry.
