There are thirty-nine grandchildren and eleven great-grand children. Mr. Warling was a striking figure of manhood, tall, massive, with long flowing beard and kindly demeanour. For many years he drove the mail, or stage from Flesherston to Feversham. He was an obliging neighbour, genial and hospitable. Was a life long Methodist and assisted in building the first church in the Vandeleur district.

The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon and was largely attended from far and near. Rev. W.

C. Almack of Durham conducting a most comforting service in the home and at the mortuary chapel at Markdale.
