

## Thompson is Reeve of Euphrasia Alex. Cameron in Artemesia

### Euphrasia

Mr. H. H. Thompson was re-elected Reeve of Euphrasia on Monday by a majority of 84 over Mr. W. H. Erskine, a former Reeve. Mr. H. E. Parker, the Goring blacksmith, is the only one of the 1931 Councillors who will sit at the table of the legislators in the township for the year 1932. Messrs. R. J. Bell, J. A. Wilson and R. D. Carruthers, a former Councillor, are the new men elected. Bell is a farmer near Heathcote while Wilson follows the same same occupation near Kimberley and R. D. Carruthers has recently gone into the butchering business with his son in the Village of Kimberley. Messrs. J. A. Gilchrist, J. A. Halbert and J. A. Cook, the other three old Councillors, will be relieved of their responsibilities at the end of the present year, but there will still be a J. A. at the Board—Wilson. Below we give the figures by polling subdivisions. No. 1 is Duncan, 2 Heathcote, 3 Fairmount, 4 Kimberley, 5 Rocklyn, 6 Beaverdale, 7 Cherry Grove, 8 Goring and 9 Wodehouse.

### Artemesia

In Artemesia the Councillors, Messrs. Wm. Burnett in the Priceville territory, Cecil Meldrum at Portlaw and Elmer Warling, the former catcher for Vandeleur's championship baseball team, were elected by acclamation. Burnett and Warling are members of the present Council and Meldrum has served in the Council before.

The present Reeve, Herb. Corbett of Proton Station, left the field to ex-Reeve Alex. Cameron, who resides east of Eugenia, and John A. Davis, the present Deputy Reeve, who farms on the East Backline near this village. They put up a real battle and the former emerged victorious by a majority of 10. Cameron is considered one of the strongest men in the township and Davis is pretty well satisfied with the vote he received. In his own polling sub-division, Orange Valley, he received 93 votes while his opponent secured but six.

The race for the Deputy's chair was between Garnet McGee, who also hails from the Eugenia Ward, and I. B. Whittaker of the Stone Settlement. McGee was a member of the Council this year and Whittaker was a member in 1930. McGee won by a majority of 87.

A vote was also taken on the question of returning to Statute Labor on the roads, and the present system was eliminated by a vote of 363 to 253. The vote by sub-divisions is given below. No. 1 is Orange Valley, 2 Fiesherston, 3 Proton Station, 4 Ceylon, 5 Priceville, 6 Vandeleur, 7 Eugenia and 8 Portlaw.
