Davis, the present Deputy Reeve, who farms on the East Backline near this village. They put up a real battle and the former emerged victorious by a majority of 10. Cameron is considered one of the strongest men in the township and Davis is pretty well satisfied with the vote he received. In his own polling sub-division, Orange Valley, he received 93 votes while his opponent secured but six.

The race for the Deputy's chair was between Garnet McGee, who also hails from the Eugenia Ward, and I. B. Whittaker of the Stone Settlement. McGee was a member of the Council this year and Whittaker was a member in 1930. McGee won by a majority of \$7.

A vote was also taken on the question of returning to Statute Labor on the roads, and the present system was eliminated by a vote of 363 to 258. The vote by sub-divisions is given below.
