

III. THE WORD IN JESUS, 1: 14-18. INTRODUCTION-The Gospel of John INTRODUCTION—The Gospel of John differs from the other three Gospels. It does not claim to be a history. It is no so much fact as interpretation of fact. The author tells "what Jesus"

is no: so much fact as interpretation of fact. The author tells "what Jesus has become to those who have known him long and found in him the satisfication of all their spiritual longings" (Dow), and are now convinced that in him they have experienced the life of God himself.

The incidents recorded are largely symboic. If a multitude is fed, this is not merely an event which took place by the Lake of Galliee—it symbolizes the eternal truth that man attains to the life divins by feeding spiritually upon Christ, the Living Bread.

The Gospel was written toward the close of the first century. Was that auth.: John, the son of Zebedee, or the preacher at Ephesus, or a disciple of John Zebedee known as John the Presbyter, or some other? Scholars differ. But its religious value is "independent of any name we may attach to it, and it has historic information that seems to carry back to some one very close to Jesus."

II. THE WORD IN HISTORY, 1: 4-13.

Jesus was not God's first revelation of himself to men. The light was always shining in the darkness, v. 5. In every age God has been present with his human children, teaching them the lessons they were fitted to learn, preparing them for a fuller revelation to come. Every age has had its prophet of righteousness, its Word of God, Abraham, Moses, Amos, No sooner did the Word come than the tragic note is sounded. Men did not receive him.

I. THE WORD IN CREATION, 1:1-3.

John introduces his readers to being whom he calls the Word. He is doing what the preacher must do loday, proclaiming tha truth in the language of his own day. "The Word" was an expression as common in John's day, as "evolution" is in ours. The Herew, when he wished to speak of God as he revealed himself to men, did not refer directly to him, but spoke of the "angel" of God, the "wisdom," the "spirit" of God. See for example, Gen. 22: 17. These erms all means the "agent" who carried out God's will among men. The Greeks had a some what similar idea. Plato yearned for "some word of God" that would bring the Supreme Being nearer to men. John uses this term to tell that Jesus of Nazareth was the expression of the mind and character of God. The Word was God-working-in-creation. "All things were made by him" (v. 3) means, "all things were made through him." See I Cor. 8: 6. In saying that "without him was not anything made that was made," John disposs the multitudes of intermediate spiritual beings in whom many of his readers believed.


