County Paving Work

(Flesherton Advance) Considerable discussion has taken place the past several weeks as to the paring of the County roads in the village of Flesherton and Markdale, and the town of Meaford. A statement was given by the County Road Superintendent of the cost to the County of about \$76,000, but it was not accurate as to the ultimate Foster 53, Harvey Hill 49, Billy cost to the county. The provincial Stoddart 40. share and the shares of the municipalities where the paving took place vere to be taken from the amount. The figures supplied by the County Engineer in figuring the cost to each municipality shows that the total payment for cost of pavement would be \$19,120 and the share of Osprey would amount to the sum of \$1, 013.36, the payment of which would be spread over a period of 20 years.

In comparison take the cost to the County of the black base pavement in the village of Dundalk. According to the engineer's figures the cost was \$22,250 and the township of Osprey was obliged to pay \$1,-179.25 and Artemesia's share would
