Election Results

Merced Re-Elected Reeve of Markdale; Heighes in Holland

The electors of Markdale were very pronounced in their verdict at the polls on Monday, endorsing the work of the 1931 Reeve and Council by re-electing all of them who stood for 1932. In the contest for the Reeve Mr. J. C. Mercer polled 231 votes, while his opponent, Mr. T. H. Reburn, secured 145. For the Council Messrs. H. Borinsky, A. W. Sproule and J. R. Dillon of last year's board were re-elected with large votes, Borinsky getting 245, Sproule 226 and Dillon 222. Mr. Albert Rusk, the only new man to be elected, received 219 votes. Mr. G. H. Haslam had 185 and Dr. L. E. Turner 75. Mr. E. B. Stewart, the other member of the 1931 Council, was not a candidate.

In Holland John Heighes, the Deputy-Reeve in 1931, was elected as Reeve. His vote was 312 while Ronald Comber, a new aspirant, had 192 and A. Acheson, ex-Reeve, had 127.

In Osprey W. L. Taylor defeated Reeve George Shortt by 11, the vote being Taylor 514, Shortt 503. Wm. Heitman won in the race for the Deputy-Reeve with a vote of 328 while his three opponents finished in this order: John Lockhart 310, R. J. Morrison 298, John Grummett 144.

Ex-Warden White was re-elected as Reeve of St. Vincent and Thos. Ashby as Deputy-Reeve.

Moderator Speaks in Local Presbyterian Church

Rev. W. G. Brown, M.A., B.D., Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, visited Markdale this week and gave an address in Cooke's Presbyterian Church Tuesday evening, Jan. 5th. The meeting was opened with devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. T. O. Miller, pastor of the church. Mr. Brown chose as a text the words of Christ, "This is the work of God that ye believe on Him whom He hath sent". After speaking of the importance of faith and of the unique personality of Christ, the Moderator dwelt at some length on the place of the church of Christ holds in the world and of the work it has accomplished. He defined the word "catholic" and claimed that no part of the Christian Church had a larger measure of catholicity than the Presbyterian. When dispensing the Lord's supper he said he always invited Christians of all denominations to participate, and at times he had had Roman Catholics join with him in the observance of the sacrament. The speaker touched on the question of religious liberty, and showed how the Presbyterian Church of various countries in by gone days had always been ready to suffer persecution rather than surrender liberty of conscience, to such an extent that this being the case that it has been called "The Martyr Church of History".

He claimed that the Church Union Act, passed by the Canadian Parliament in 1924, transgressed the principle of religious liberty, by depriving Presbyterians of their property because they refused to enter a church whose doctrines and polity they did not approve.

Mr. Brown told of some examples of devoted service to the Presbyterian Church in the far west—a young woman, highly talented and well educated, riding the plains of the west to minister to the sick and needy—of examples of sacrificial giving in behalf of home mission work in the west—of the necessity of maintaining the work of the Presbyterian Church in the far out ports in the Peace River district. He referred to the deficit in the missionary funds of the Presbyterian Church, and stated that one dollar from every member of the church would wipe out that deficit, and that it is expected this will be accomplished by Easter of this year.

Mr. Brown graduated from the Presbyterian College, Montreal in 1902. He has spent all his ministry in the west. He was for many years at Red Deer, Alberta, and has been known all over the west as "Brown of Red Deer". He is now pastor of a flourishing congregation in Saskatoon, Sask. He has not been in his own home since last August, and expects to continue visiting the various Presbyteries of the church during the winter and spring. It is rumored that he has been offered the degree of Doctor of Divinity, but has declined the honor, preferring to be known as plain Mr. Brown. His message will be long remembered by those who heard him.
