The death of William Nelson Petch occurred in the hospital at Markdale on Friday, Jan. 1st, in his sixtieth year. He had suffered for some length of time from inward cancer and death finally came as a sweet release.

**Walters Falls Short Course**

Their lectures will be continued on Wednesday afternoon.

On Friday afternoon the sheep division of the Federal Department will conduct lectures and demonstrations on sheep husbandry. The Ladies' course is in charge of Mrs. Jean Hamilton Shearer who has charge of the Domestic Science lectures. She is assisted by Miss E. Cleland who is the instructor in dress-making. Mr. A. V. Langton, assistant Agricultural Representative, will be the resident master of the men's courses. T. Stewart Cooper, Agricultural Representative, will be on hand daily or as frequently as other duties will permit.
