The inaugural meeting of 1932 Council elect was held in Township hall on Monday, Jan. 11th. All members present and after subscribing to the necessary declarations, took their seats as follows: Thos. J. Brodie, Reeve, John A. Boyd, John McGirr, John McKechnie, Samuel H. Wright, Councillors. The minutes of December meeting were read and adopted.

Communications were read from Dept. of Public Highways re Township Road Superintendent, Ontario Good Roads Association re convention, Secretary Provincial U.F.O. re convention, recommendations re new regulations re Fire Insurance Companies, Provincial Weed Inspector re appointing of local inspector, Township Road Superintendent, Mr. M. Black presented Payment Voucher No. 1 for Road Improvement amounting to \$118.27, which was adopted.

The following by-laws were read a third time and passed: No. 744, appointing W. A. Robinson and Patrick McMillan, auditors for 1932 at a salary of \$1500 each; No. 745, appointing Wm. Banks, caretaker of township hall for 1932, salary \$25; No. 746, appointing local Board of Health for 1932 as follows: Dr. A. Brown, M.O.H., Thos. J. Brodie, Reeve, member ex officio, Henry Beaton, member and H. H. MacDonald, secretary and R. J. Torry and John Eliason, Sanitary Inspectors; No. 747, appointing R. G. Peart, Assessor of Township for 1932 at salary of \$90.00; No. 748, authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow up to \$10000 on credit of Municipality for current expenditure for 1932, and by-law No. 749, appointing Frank Meagher as Weed Inspector for 1932 at salary of 30 cents per hour for time actually engaged at said employment.

The following accounts were passed: C. Ramage and Son, printing and advertising account \$148.29; Royal Bank, Durham, collection of taxes for 1931, \$11.50; Bank of Toronto, Markdale, collection of taxes for 1931, \$6.90; Bank of Montreal, Markdale, collection of taxes for 1931, \$3.20; Bank of Commerce at Durham, collection of taxes for 1931, \$10.00; Bank of Commerce, Durham, interest on overdraft 75 cents; J. McKechnie, 1 1/2 days committee work, \$4.50; 8 subscriptions

to Municipal World, \$5.00.

McKechnie - Boyd—That John McGirr be appointed with the auditors to examine the Treasurer's surticles.—Carried.

McGirr - Wright—That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign the petition for Statutory Grant on monies spent on highways and

bridges in 1931 and submit the same to the Minister of Highways, said expenditures amounting to the sum of \$9166.—Carried.

McGirr - Wright—That this Council endorse the recommendations of the United Farmers of Ontario in convention regarding changes in policies of Fire Insurance

Companies and that Clerk be instructed to forward copy of this resolution to the secretary.—Carried.

McGirr - Boyd—That Council meetings for the year 1932 be held as follows in township hall: Jan. 11th, Feb. 13th, April 2nd, May 7th, June 4th, July 2nd, Aug. 6th, Sept. 3rd, Oct. 1st, Nov. 15th, Dec.

10th and Board of Health meetings to be on the following dates at 2 o'clock, p.m.: Feb. 13th, May 7th, Aug. 6th, Nov. 15th.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to February 13th, 1932, for the receiving of the Auditors' Report and for general business.

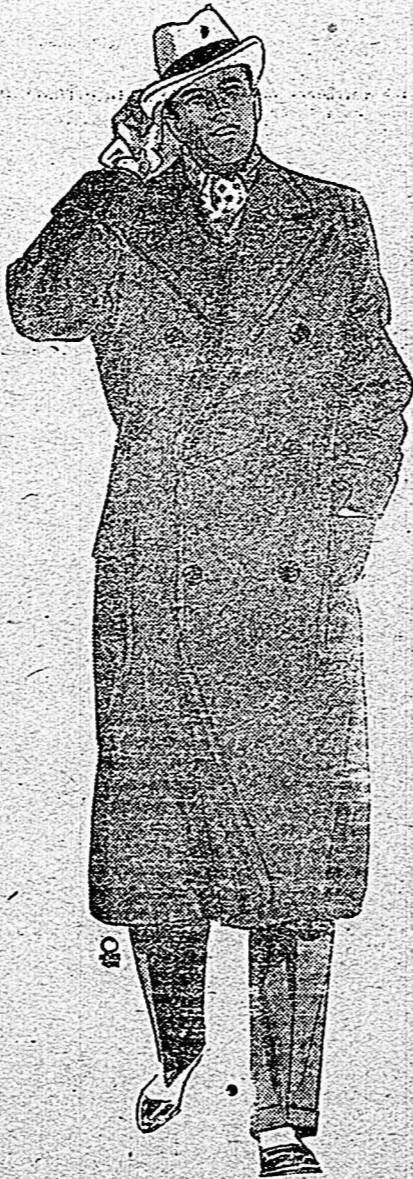
