With the Canadian dollar where it is in the market, there is a marked tendency to keep it at home and many Canadians are spending, or planning to spend, the winter and the holidays of the British Columbia, instead of "going south". Fifteen per cent can mean a whole lot of dollars and the British Columbia coastline is one of nature's most beautiful spots, anyway.

There are 32,209 schools or colleges in Canada, taught by 83,134 teachers and attended by 2,490,623 pupils, or one quarter of the Dominion's population. The average expenditure is about \$66 on each pupil enrolled. Attendance is on the up grade, being 77 per cent for the whole Dominion, as against 64.7 in 1919. And the future of technical education is assured, for the Technical Education Act provides for Federal grants of \$750,000 per year for 15 years, which means that the night schools will be able to run, to say nothing of the day courses in technical institutions. 806.

Fergus Wins

Judgment for the village of Fergus for \$11,600.58 in the action brought by the municipality against the County of Wellington was handed down on Monday by Hon. Justice Rose. The case was heard at a recent session of the Supreme Court in Guelph.

In addition to the actual sum named in the foregoing, the judgment includes interest on \$2,213.31 from April 1, 1929; for \$3,431.02 from April 1, 1929; on \$3,347.63 from April 1, 1930 and on \$3,414 from April 1, 1931, until judgment. Defendant must pay the plaintiff's costs.

In the judgment handed down, Mr. Justice Rose states: "The Council of the County of Wellington long ago adopted a plan of county road improvement and established a county road system. In the years 1926, 1927, 1928, 1929 and 1930, a general rate was levied upon the municipalities in the county and the Village of Fergus paid the sums for which it was assessed. But the county did not, in any of the years 1927—1931 remit to the village 75 per cent of the amount raised in the village in the preceding year (or any other sum) and this action is brought to compel the county to pay such 75 per centum."

Fergus will be flush for funds now. Are there any other towns or villages in line for a similar attack. There was some talk of that a while ago. We think they were hardly on the same footing. Fergus is to be congratulated on the stiff and successful legal fight it put up, even if it does put up our county rates a little. The audit toon was ayre a bonnie fechter.—Mt. Forest Confederate.

Local Improvement Notice

TAKE NOTICE THAT:

- The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Markdale intends to construct as local improvements the works on the streets between the points set out in the Schedule hereto marked "A", and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the works.
- The estimated cost of the work, the proportion of the cost which is to be paid by the Corporation, and the estimated costs of the works per foot frontage, is set out in the Schedule "A" hereto. The special assessment is to be paid in twenty annual instalments.
- A petition to the said Council will not avail to prevent its construction, but a petition against the work or the manner in which it has been undertaken, may be made pursuant to Section 8 of the Local Improvement Act, to the Railway and Municipal Board by a majority of the owners representing at least one-half of the value of the lots which are to be specially assessed therefor.
- A By-Law for undertaking the work will be considered by the Council at a meeting thereof to be held on the 4th day of April, 1932, or at a regular or special meeting thereof to be held thereafter.
