The Important Apple An analysis of the business trans-

ctions on 380 farms in Nova Scotia, Quebec and Ontario during the year Queeec and Untario during the year ending May 31, 1930, has been made by the Economic Analyst, published by the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. It was found that the growing of apples was an enterprise of mportance on all of these farms, alhough the growers claimed that returns were unsatisfactory in that particular year. On 158 Nova Scotia particular year. On 158 Nova Scotia farms the average gross income was \$4,210. Of this amount \$2,654 were obtained from the sale of apples; \$308 from the sale of other crops, and \$1,046 from live stock and their products. On 74 farms in Quebec the average gross receipts were \$2. products. On 14 larms in Quebec the average gross receipts were \$3, 336. Of this amount apples prod-uced \$2,402; other crops \$253, and live stock and their products \$436. In Ontario the average gross receipts from 148 farms were \$4,512. this amount \$2,402 came from ap-

ples; \$917 from other crops, and \$1,-012 from live stock and their prod-ucts. Sales of apples produced 63 per cent. of the income of farms investigated in Nova Scotia; 70.9 per cent. in Quebec and 52.8 per cent. in Ontario. The Russians emphasize with incredible cleverness and incredible success the efforts of separate units and of the whole economic system to put through the Five-Year Plan. An article with two pictures on the first page bears a three-column headline: "Tae Iron Baker. Bread Fac tory No. 5 a Brilliant Achievement of the Soviet Union. Engineer Marsakov Is the Organizer of the Triumph." The dispatch is written in a good, sharp style. It relates that German and English manufact urers of machinery had asserted that their methods were the most high ly rationalized, but Russia has completely outstripped them by building a bread factory without foreign aid Not one foreign nail was used. The factory is ready. Nine persons in eight working hours can make 10,-000 loaves of bread entirely by ma-

chinery.

The second page contains descrip tions of daily Soviet affairs. Every other word is relentless self-criticism. One must admit that it is a sign of strength that this expanding, ambi tious system permits itself so much cardid self-criticism in public.

There is a description of how loscow has failed to receive its supply of vegetables according to plan. Instead of the 532,574 tons of potatoes that were supposed to have been delivered, the city has received only 326,461 tons. Even the deliveries that are made often go to the wrong place. Why Aifalfa Fails

Much alfalfa seed has been wasted and much disappointment caused by the absence in the soil in which the seed has been sown of the neces-sary bacteria, without which the plant cannot go on and thrive as farm crops are expected to do. Unfortunately there is no quick method of testing for the presence of legume bacteria of any strain in the soil. The only way to make certain is to grow a legume and note whether there is an abundant supply of nodules on the roots. There are, how ever, certain circumstances which indicate more or less definitely whether inoculation of the soil is re-

quired in a given case. There is reason to suspect a scarcity of bacteria in the soil when the crop in question has not been previously cultivated. In this case inocculation is strongly recommended.
