Mr. D. A. Graham of the H.E.P. C. and children of Flesherton were visitors at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Graham last week.

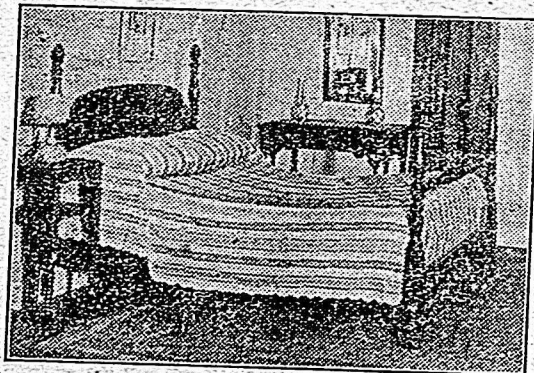
